Proceedings of Mariposa Council

Mariposa Council met May 8, 1911. Messrs. Seth Armitage and William Wells were present respecting sale of title to road allowance at north half of con. 15, between lots 19, 20 and 21. Mr. Richard Rich was present to arrange a right of way northward from gravel pit at lot 18, con. 7. Mr. Qas. Webster wanted a grant to assist in building road allowance on con. 8, as he considered this one of the main roads of the township. Lorenzo Davidson thought it would be wise to purchase some stone from Mr. Robt Pogue, as gravel in his vicinity is somewhat scarce. Mr. Jas Curtis desired Council to do some grading and draining on road allowance opposite his farm and to north of railroad track. Mr. Edwin Rogers reports on drainage matters as requested, at or near Mr. J. W. Hancock's. The commissioners, D. Yerex and R.S. Mark report on work for future.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED Motion by Messrs. Aarcoe and Ferguson that Messrs. Michael and Rogers be appointed a committee to look into the matter of road allowance at lot 19 and 20 in con. 15—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Swain and Ferguson that Clerk be authorized to notify Mr. Richard Dale to come to meeting to explain his action in removing trees from road allowance opposite his farm.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Ferguson and Rogers that Messrs. Swain and Varcoe be appointed to look into matter of purchasing stone from Robt Pogue for township purposes.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Swain and Rogers that Messrs. Michael, Varcoe and Ferguson be appointed to arrange for grading road and drainage at Mr. Mr. Jas Curtis' farm north of railroad track.

Motion by Messrs. Ferguson and Swain that, pursuant to Sec. 617a of Municipal Act, this Council hereby declares that a bridge situated between lots 20 and 21 in con 4 of T'p of Mariposa, is over 300 feet long and it is therefore unjust that township should be liable for the whole cost of the maintenance and repair of said bridge, and that it should be maintained and repaired by Corporation of the County of Victoria, and that application should be made to Judge of County Court of Victoria for an order declaring such bridge a County bridge, to be repaired and maintained by County Corporation and that Clerk be instructed to forward a certified copy of this resolution with the Corporate Seal attached, to Clerk of the County of Victoria.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Rogers and Varcoe that Council allow Mr Chas Rich sum of \$10.00 for a right of way northward from gravel pit on his farm at lot 13, con. 7 for a term of two years. Mr. Rich to put up a good gate at boundary line between his lot and Mr G. A. Washington's lot.

Motion by Messrs. Rogers and that Mr. Jos. Jewell, Jr., be appointed overseer in road beat No. 7 on Western boundary of Mariposa in

stead of Jos. Jewell removed.—Carried. Motion by Messrs. Ferguson and Swain that Clerk be authorized to notify the following persons to meet at or near lot 10 con 15, Mariposa to consider matter of drainage under the Ditches and Watercourse act on Thursday May 25th at 2 p.m., namely Colin Graham, John Currie, John Campbell, Angus Jamieson and Reeve of Mariposa.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Varcoe and Ferguson, that Messrs. Michael and Rogers be appointed to inspect a gravel pit on Mr. Eli Short's farm, and if found advisable to purchase a pit from him.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Rogers and Swain that Messrs. Michael, Varcoe, Ferguson and Swain be a committee to negotiate with Mr. John Glenny for digging a waterway on the north side of road allowance, east of his barn at lot 17, con. 5 in order that he may do away with the building and maintenance of bridges.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Varcoe and Ferguson that council grant the sum of \$60 for building cement walks along township property at the township hall.—Carried.

Accounts aggregating \$250.00 were ordered to be paid, including sum of \$200.00 for operating, working & repairs for the grader.

Motion by Messrs. Swain and Rogers that Clerk's salary be advanced to \$500.00 per year, and that the Treasurer's salary be advanced to \$200.00 per year.—Carried.

Council adjourned till Saturday, June 3, for Court of Revision, and for general business.
