COUNCIL DID NOT FAVOR APPOINTMENT OF BOARD OF FINANCE COMMISSIONERS

From Tuesday's Post. At last night's meeting of the Finance Committee, Chairman Smale said that in a few months the town would likely have some \$275,000 of bonds to sell. At present the municipality was ready to issue straight terms bonds, which the market more and more demands. If straight term bonds were issued we could dispose of them in British and United States markets, whereas instalment bonds could only be sold in this county.

Mr. Smale said that while he and the Mayor were in Toronto they were informed that if the town sold its bonds as straight term it would mean a saving of \$7,300 to the town. Then the selling of straight term bonds means the creation of a sinking fund. If the town decides to purchase the power plant a commission of citizens would have to be selected to handle it just as the Board of Water Commissioners was constituted, and Mr. Smale strongly advocated the appointment of a Commission, composed of two reputable men, who would

look after the sinking fund and invest it to the best advantage. His Worship Mayor Beal said Mr. Smale's proposition meant getting away from responsible government, and adopting the autocratic form. The Council was responsible to the people for its actions, and he would not favor the proposition of Ald. Smale's under any consideration.

Reeve McCrae endorsed Mayor Beal's stand and pointed out some of the elements of danger which might arise should such a commission be appointed.

Reeve Vrooman also opposed the proposition in a strong speech. The provincial statutes, he pointed out, gave the municipality the opportunity of placing its bonds with the Provincial Treasurer at four per cent and he urged this as the proper course to pursue. He would never consent to the town adopting such a proposition as submitted by Ald. Smale.

After some further discussion, in which Ald. Smale explained exhaustively his proposed scheme, the Council decided to take no action in the matter.

HAMLET WIPED OUT BY BLAZE

Maynooth, May, 15.—The hamlet known as Lake St. Peter was Saturday afternoon destroyed by fire. The fire started in the woods about 10 a.m., and there was a fierce gale blowing straight for the village. It was almost impossible to live in the vicinity, owing to the smoke and the heat. The Rathbun Company lost all their plant there. The village Saturday looked like a huge fallow, and anything not burned was either floating in Lake St. Peter or sunk to the bottom. There remains only Banagher's boarding-house, the school-house, and one dwelling house. By the almost superhuman efforts of Wm. Netterville, fire ranger, and T. O'Neal those buildings were saved.

At 4 o'clock a relief train came up from Bancroft and picked up the women and children, who were hemmed in by fire, and could not get out of danger unaided. It was reported that Wm. Livingston had perished in his house, but he had taken his horses out in the lake and kept them in water to save them from burning.

The fire is still raging in the woods along the railroad, and if it does not rain much more damage will be done. As it is, there are about thirty people homeless.

Geo. Ashman, thro' Reeve Steele, sent in his resignation as member of Board of Health, accepting a position in Lindsay. A. D. McEachern—McFadyen, That resignation be accepted, and John Staples, Kirkfield, be appointed to fill out.—Carried.

A by-law to appoint J. Staples as member of the B. O. H. to fill the place of Geo. Ashman, was introduced by Messrs. McFadyen and Spence and passed.

W. F. McEachern—A. D. McEachern—That Council does not approve of Georgian Bay and Seaboard Railway crossing boundary of Eldon and Thora unless approach to railway be guarded by fences.—Carried.

On motion of W. F. McEachern and A. D. McEachern accounts to amount of \$89.83 were passed.

Spence, W. F. McEachern, That this Council instruct Reeve Steele to make

full arrangements with township solicitor to defend T'p in action taken by Geo. Kinghorner, flooding by water. Council adjourned to meet at Lorneville on May 29, as Court of Revision. B. STACEY, Clerk.

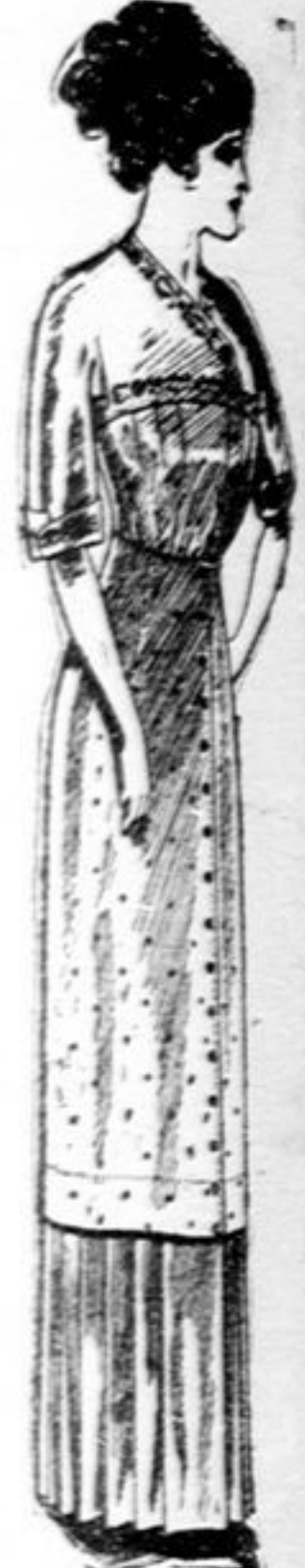
