Peterboro is at present dealing with , boro was the place in which to loa proposition to acquire a power and light plant with the object of supplying the city with both under Municipal management. One part of the matter being discussed is that concerning the taking over of the plant. supply lines and customers of the Otonabee Power Co. This Company has a plant at Dam No. 5, and if this were combined with Dam No. 6 at least 3000 h. p. would be assured. It is not known if the Company will sell, but the report of the Hydro-Electric Commission names the figure of \$225,000 as a not unreasonable price. Company has a revenue of \$30,060 per year, derived from a load of 1250 h.p.
