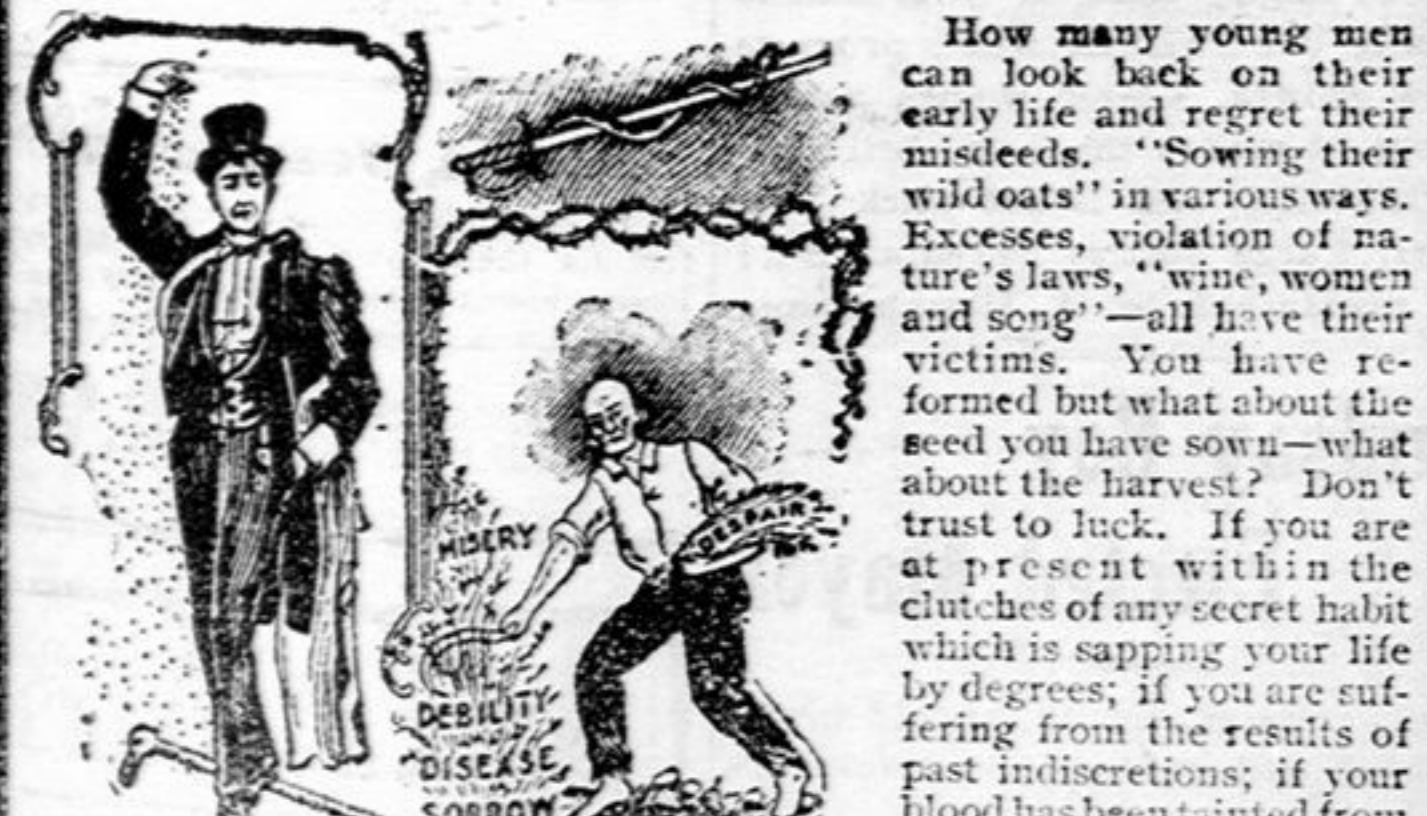

PHASES OF MUNICIPAL POWER QUESTION FROM TWO DIFFERENT STANDPOINTS

Peterboro is at present dealing with a proposition to acquire a power and light plant with the object of supplying the city with both under Municipal management. One part of the matter being discussed is that concerning the taking over of the plant, supply lines and customers of the Otonabee Power Co.

Considerable variance of opinion exists as to going into the project. It has its advocates and its opposition. An interesting bit of information is the expressed opinion of two citizens, both able men and particularly well qualified by their professional standing and experience to express opinion both for and against the proposition.

Speaking in favor of it, one says: The Engineer's report was a conservative one, and well within the facts. He mentioned some facts in connection with the conservation of water supply. He knew that if the waters contributory to this district were available there would be a most ample supply, and greatly enhanced power possibilities of the district.

He felt that the figures indicated a reasonable cost of development. The powers were invaluable, and in the future would be increasingly so. The investment would be a good one—would pay, would steady the price of power, and assist to reduce the cost of light.

SLEW THE WRONG MAN IN REVENGE AND MUST DIE ON THE CALLOWS

Sault Ste. Marie, May, 11.—Wm. Carroll, aged 65, who in 1902, escaped from the London asylum upon the eve of his discharge as fully cured, was convicted of the murder of Jos. Tallion, in a lumber camp near Blind River, at the Assizes here this afternoon.

Both men were employed at Wddie Bros. camp last November and according to three witnesses, Carroll entered the shanty at 5.30 in the evening and struck Tallion on the head with a double-bit axe afterwards admitting that he had mistaken Tallion for another man.

\$30,000 BLAZE AT PETERBORO
