The question now before the citizens was Did they want to keep the pay rolls in their towo? The town had a factory which had been giving \$30,000 to \$50,000 a year in pay rolls. That ncern was now shipping its goods to Argentine, Germany, Russia, and other countries, and the same great possibilities were before the Sylvester Co.

The citizens, Mr. McComb said, had the solution of the problem at hand, in the shape of a market for the Company's goods. It has got to be a Lindsay enterprise before outside money 's secured. AN INVENTOR'S SON.

Mr. G. Stevenson, son of the inventor of the great disc drill, was the next speaker. He stated that in 1880 he had gone to the West to his fath er, who had journeyed there some years before. He saw the necessity of making a drill which would meet the requirements of the country. At that time they were able to get two crops out of seven, and in ploughing the ground a stubble was left, which was used as a fertilizer. His father afterwards invented a double disc seeder, and worked it through the fields of mud. After perfecting the drill he went to the U.S., and a concern took it up, and paid him the largest royalty ever paid on any Egricultural implement. The demand was so great that the Monitor Co. bought the patent for \$150,000. These discs have increased in sale every year. There is no comparison and it stands without a peer. The Moline Plough Co. bave increased the sale of this machine over 100 per cent. They have made over one hundred thousand of these discs in the past year.

The Sylvester Mfg. Co., hold the patent for this drill in Canada. The possibilities of the great west from an agricultural standpoint were great and the citizens of Lindsay had it in their hands to make this industry what it really ought to be-one of the greatest in the country.



Mr. J. D Flavelle said he did not come to the meeting with the intention of speaking. Besides he was not looking for investments. If the citizens of the town took hold of proposition, which he considered an excellent one, and lead, he might follow. 
