It is alleged to see from this great Company, with its millions of capital, the statement had been made that there was no better drill made in Canada than the Sylvester article.

The Sylvester Mfg. Co. was a solvent concern, said Mr. McComb, but it was impossible to meet the competitive conditions owing to the long credits given.

Two propositions were therefore presented to the Company. One contemplated the sale of the plant to a syndicate, who are acquiring a number of the smaller implement plants in the east in connection with the selling agency in the west.

Mr. Sylvester said Mr. McComb could sell the plant to the merger and get a reasonable amount of cash, and he advised him to take advantage of the proposition.

The International Harvesting Co., had written that it would be glad to secure an interest in the drill plant of the Company, with a view to purchasing and manufacturing elsewhere.

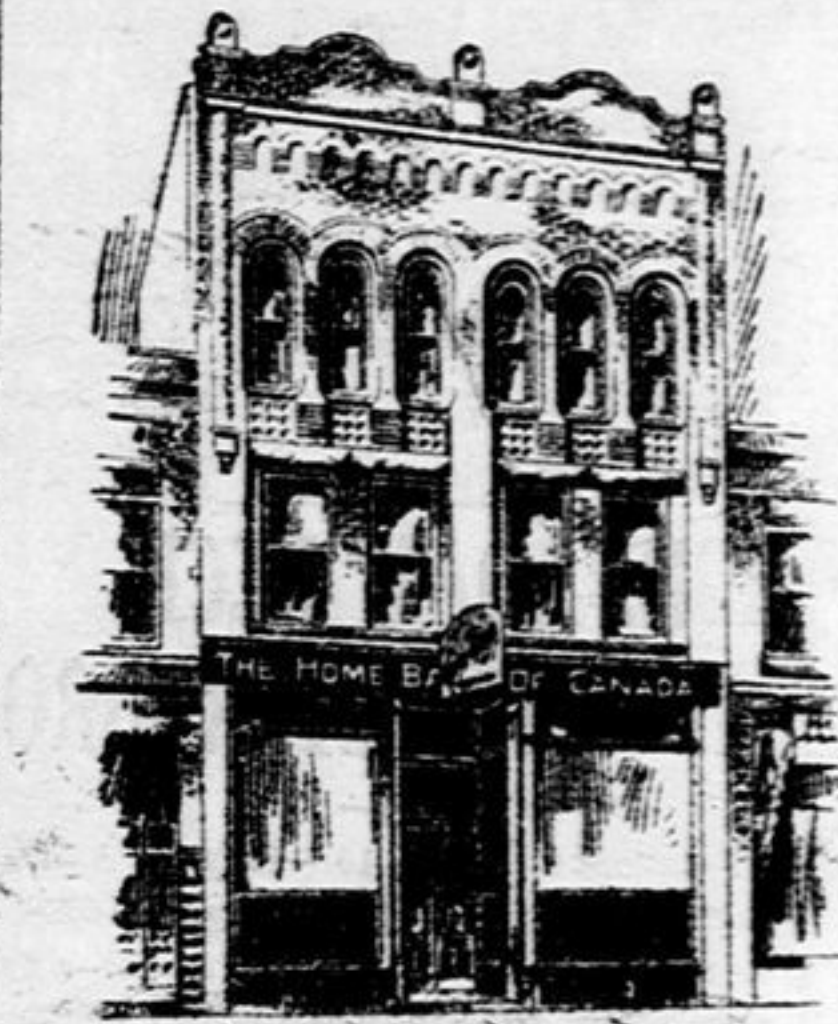
