## CONTINENTAL SCRIP.

What a Two Dollar Bill of the Year 1774 Looked Like.

One of the few pieces of continental scrip now in existence is owned by a former teacher at Shortridge high school. It was given to her at Christmas time in 1868 by a fellow teacher. The piece measures about 5% by 21/2 inches and is framed to show both sides. Within an intricate leaf and branch border design, on the front side, is printed:

"This indented bill of \$2 shall entitle the bearer thereof to receive bills of exchange, payable in London, or gold and silver, at the rate of 4s. 6d. sterling per dollar for the said bill, according to the directions of an act of assembly of Maryland. Dated in Au napolis, this 10th day of April anno Domini, 1774. William Eddis H. Lap

In an upper corner of the reverse side is a picture, about an inch and a half square, representing the British crown, at each side of which is a tiny picture of a man. One of the men is represented as holding a spade, while from the hand of the other dangles fish on a string. At each end on this side of the scrip are the words, "'Tis death to counterfeit," and at the bottom are the names of the printers, A. C. and F. Green.-Indianapolis News.
