ROYAL BIRTHDAYS

For more than sixty years the "Queen's birthday" was celebrated in Canada with a fervor unknown in the mother land. It was observed not merely officially, but as a public holiday. Successive generations of schoolboys delighted to shout the rollicking rhyme, "Twenty-fourth of May is the Queen's birthday; if you don't give us a holiday, we'll all run away."

The question is beginning to be seriously discussed whether Victoria day is to be regarded as established for all time. One of its advantages was that it occurred just when the Canadian spring was merging into the Canadian summer, and outdoor celebrations could be had in an environment of vernal beauty.

The fact that there is but an interval of a few days between Victoria day and the birthday of our present King—the 3rd of June—seems to invite a reconsideration of the whole question. In the weather, and in the aspect of nature there is little difference between the earlier and the later date.

Probably seem best to allow the present arrangement to continue unchanged—at least until the children of today are old men and women. In the British House of Commons, a few days ago, Colonel Seeley, secretary of state for war, replying to a question about the 24th of May, said, "I am aware that in many of the self-governing dominions it is regarded as a public holiday, and is so observed. In this country we prefer to observe the King's birthday."
