

### ROWELL'S SINCERITY WAS DEFENDED

Ottawa, May 5.—A clear-cut tribute to the worth and consistency of Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., leader of the Ontario Liberal party, was given in the House tonight, during the consideration of the militia estimates.

In the course of the debate the discussion had turned to a visit made by Colonel Hughes to an Eastern Townships club at which liquor was sold, and in replying to Liberal questions and assertions the Minister threw in the comment that Mr. Rowell was a member of the Ontario Club where liquor could be obtained by members.

"Mr. Rowell is a most consistent temperance man," began Mr. F. F. Pardee, of Lambton, jumping to his feet, but was interrupted by ridiculing laughter from Government members. "Honorable members opposite may say 'No, no' went on Mr. Pardee with fire, "but there is not a man of them who can honestly say that N. W. Rowell isn't a most consistent man, who lives up to the tenets he preaches, probably more faithfully than any other man in public life in Canada today." (Liberal cheers.)

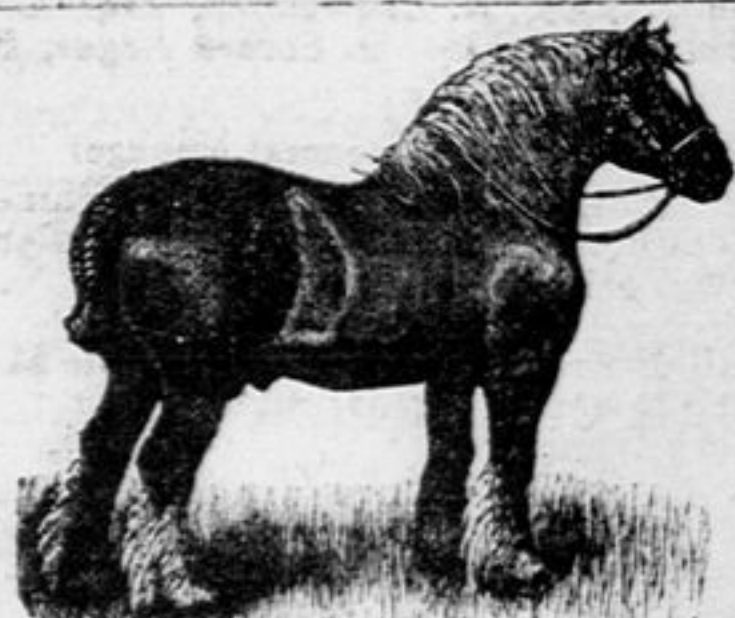

### ASKING GRANT FROM COUNCIL

The McDonnell Park Committee met last night in the Council Chamber for the purpose of dealing with matters in connection with the property and more especially with the proposed civic club house and the fitting up of the house on the park site for that purpose.

The question was discussed at length and from all standpoints, when it was finally decided to ask the council for the sum of \$1,000 for the purpose of undertaking the work of renovation and improvement. The sum asked from the town will, of course, not be sufficient to meet the improvements outlined, but the committee desired to ask as little as possible from the town, as local organizations will be asked to devise ways and means to assist in fitting up the Club. The ladies of the town are also anxious to assist, so that the committee feels that, with the grant which they hope to receive from the town, as well as with the assistance of local organizations, the improvements necessary, as well as the upkeep and maintenance of the institution is assured.

Satisfaction was expressed on all sides at the splendid results accomplished on cleaning up day at the park. A wonderful transformation in the appearance of the grounds has been the result.

### FARMERS TRADE IN LINDSAY

Peterboro, May 9.—Mr. T. C. Elliott and Mr. R. G. Kingan visited the market this morning for the purpose of interviewing the farmers as to what should be done to improve the local market. One of the points brought out may be handed over to the Board of Trade. The farmers west of the city find that the Port McNicholl train is particularly beneficial to Lindsay. The train leaves Peterboro at 9.16 and stops at stations such as Cavanville, Bethany, and others, reaches Lindsay in good time, and also returns at a favorable hour in the evening.

Mr. Elliott stated some effort should be made to secure a C.P.R. train at a corresponding hour for Peterboro. The farmers prefer to trade here, the business advantages are better and the Board of Trade might be able to obtain a service from the company.

The committee will make its presentation to the Retail Merchants' Association in the near future. Only one visit has been made to the market, but Mr. Elliott and Mr. Kingan secured quite a number of ideas which they will report.

### GYPSIES WILL NOT BE MOLESTED

Peterboro, May 7.—A band of twenty-five gypsies claiming Montreal headquarters, are camped just south of the city limits. The entire party present an air of respectability that differs from the usual van people. Last evening P. O. Chief Thompson investigated the camp in pursuance to a wire from Detective Scarth of the Dominion Police Force, but found everything to be all right. The Dominion Officer in his wire expressed the belief that the party were Mexicans, and he was trying to get them close to the border in order to effect their deportation. Evidently the officer had the wrong party. They will be allowed to remain here unmolested.

The party came here a few days ago from the vicinity of Lindsay. Several of the men could be seen around the city today engaged in trying to dicker in horse flesh.

Conservation with one of the men was to the effect that they had always paid for everything they got, and were more or less on the trip for a health trip, with horse trading as a side line.

The party are fairly well dressed, the women having the usual gypsy costume.

The party expect to remain around the city for a couple of weeks.

### ENGINEER'S ACCOUNT SURPRISED COUNCIL

At last night's council session an account was dealt with from Smith & Smith, engineers, which took away the breath of the members. The account read as follows:—

To services, layout and supervision Elgin-st. sanitary sewer, 5 per cent on cost (\$1,500) \$75.00; investigation J. L. Hughes drainage matters, St. Patrick-st. \$5.00.

"Who ordered the engineer to do this work?" asked several members in chorus. "Is there any resolution on the books where the council gave instructions for this work?" asked other members.

In answer to these queries, it was pointed out that Engineer Smith had undertaken the work on the advice of Mr. Kylie, who was chairman of the Board of Works, although no instructions had been given by the council to engage the engineer's services.

It was also pointed out that Engineer Hopkins, who was acting as town engineer, took the levels of the Elgin-st. sewer.

The council decided to let the account stand over for future consideration.

### ALEX MARKS FOUND DEAD IN LAUNCH

Perth, May 11.—Alex Marks, a member of the well-known Marks family of theatrical companies, was found dead this afternoon in his launch on Christy Lake. Mr. Marks ad left his cottage this morning to go to the foot of the lake, and when he did not return a search was made by his brother-in-law, Morley White, with the above result. Mr. Marks was known in almost every town and city in Ontario, and many New York State towns, being advanced for many years for the Marks Brothers' Company.

### TOWN MUST PAY SMALL PROPORTION

The following is the certified copy of the order of the Board of Railway Commissioners re the removal of the G.N.W. Telegraph Co's poles from Kent-st. It was received on Wednesday by Town Solicitor Stinson from Mr. A. D. Cartwright, Secretary of the Commission:—

In the matter of the application of the Town of Lindsay, in the Province of Ontario, hereinafter called the 'Applicant,' for an Order directing the Great North Western Telegraph Company of Canada to remove its poles from Kent street, in the said town of Lindsay: File No. 22901.

Upon hearing the application at the sittings of the Board held in Toronto, October 13th, 1913, in the presence of Counsel, for the Applicant and the Great North Western Telegraph Company of Canada, and what was alleged at the hearing; and upon the report of the Electrical Engineers of the Board, and reading the submissions filed—

IT IS ORDERED

1. That the Great North Western Telegraph Company of Canada be, and it is hereby, directed (1) to remove the telegraph wires on Victoria Avenue and Lindsay street, between Russell and Kent streets; and (2) to carry the telegraph wires from Victoria Avenue and from Lindsay street in aerial cables attached to the telephone poles now erected on Russell street, to the north-south lane near the centre of the block, bounded by Cambridge and William streets, and through the said lane and an alley running east and west in the centre of the block to the Telegraph Office,—subject to the condition that the Applicant acquire for the said Company the following rights, namely:

(a) To make attachments to the telephone poles on Russell street.

(b) To guy, replace, alter or strengthen in any necessary way the telephone poles to which the said Company may wish to attach its cables.

(c) To run through the lane and alley above mentioned.

2. That the Great North Western Telegraph Company bear and pay the expense of making the necessary connections as set out in clauses (a), (b), and (c) herein; the cost of the remainder of the work to be borne and paid \$150 by the Great North-western Telegraph Company, the balance to be paid by the Applicant; said balance to be paid by the Applicant Company upon an account or accounts therefor rendered to it by the Telegraph Company.

3. That any dispute which may arise as to the nature or cost of the work be settled by the Electrical Engineer of the Board.

### ELECTIONS MAY BE DEFERRED

Toronto, May 9.—It looks as though the Government is hedging with regard to the date of an election. A week ago the date had been determined upon and it was expected that the dissolution would immediately be announced and the writs issued for polling on June 29. But things have happened since then that have put an entirely different complexion on the matter, and it was stated to The Globe last night that the election would probably go over until the fall, some time in September being the most likely date.

Where is the Excuse?

One of the difficulties confronting the Government is how to justify an election at the present time. With Sir James Whitney more or less in charge at Queen's Park, there seems to be little to warrant a demand for a dissolution. The "redistribution" of the constituencies, such as it is, would be regarded by most people as the fimsiest of all excuses. A Cabinet reorganization is an eventuality that would provide some reasonable ground, but if Sir James Whitney is to remain at the head for some time further this will likely be postponed. The Premier was at his office again yesterday.

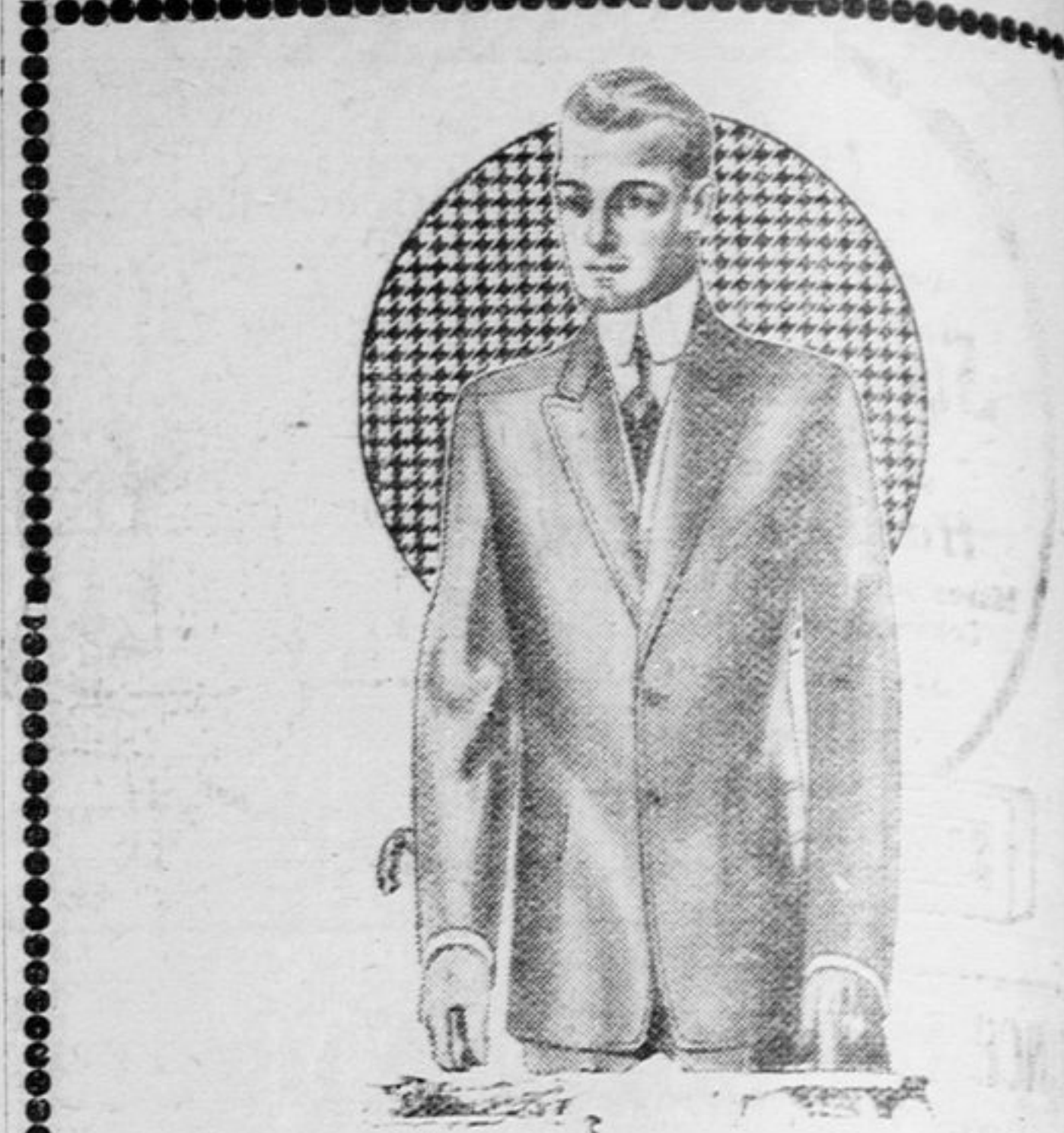
While many of the members protested in caucus against a fall campaign, it would seem now that September is the chosen time. The few weeks between the harvest and the fall fairs would prove an ideal campaign season. Another difficulty of holding an election in June is the trouble of getting the lists in the unorganized districts prepared. They cannot be completed in time to hold an election on June 29, although it is possible to set the date back for a week or two, but the summer is not a popular time, and the hot weather might see too many people away on vacation to suit the strategy of the Conservative party. It is better to go to the people on a good harvest.

Then there is the diversion caused by the sitting of the Federal House, and the local members would like to have the co-operation of their friends.

### HEROIC ACT OF BRAKEMAN

Peterboro, May 12.—The life of a young child was heroically saved yesterday by the front brakeman of a freight train, which was steaming into Tweed about 12.30 p.m. According to the story, as it was told to a local man, the freight was nearing Tweed, at a fair rate of speed. The brakeman was at that time in the cab of the engine, and, looking out, thought he saw a form between the tracks, some distance ahead. Further investigation revealed the fact that it was a child, sat down between the rails. Without further hesitation the brakeman climbed over the engine, and on to the cow-catcher, and as the freight came up with the child, he grabbed the body in his hand, and flung both himself and the child into a ditch on one side of the engine. Peculiar to relate, neither man nor child was injured at all. The name of the brakeman could not be ascertained. The train at the time the rescue was effected was going into Tweed from the west, down a big grade, and, as is usual, a certain amount of precaution was being taken. The child was of such tender years as to be apparently unaware of the danger to which it was exposed, and but for the lucky act of the brakeman, it would doubtless have been killed by the massive locomotive.

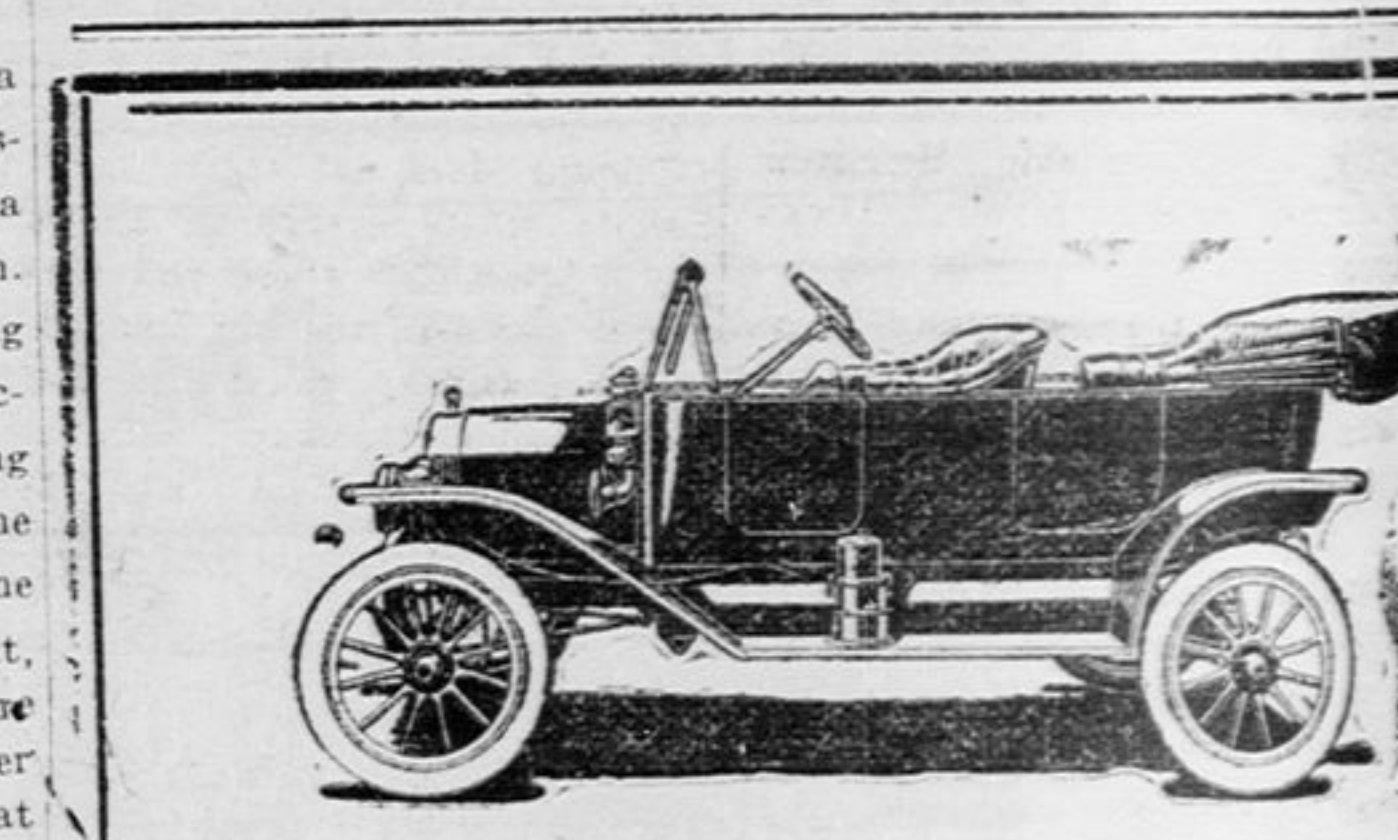

**THE MINIMUM WAGE**

(The Canadian Courier.)

Many people favor a minimum wage for women and minors, but few favor it for men. Nine states of the Union now have a minimum wage law for women, although it is too early to say how they are working out. In Victoria, Australia, they have had a minimum wage law for both men and women for seven years. Recent statistics of the clothing industry in that state show results as follows:

Minimum wage	\$10.80
Average wage	12.84
Per cent excess	18.3

This shows that a minimum wage law may work to help the worker out interfering with the interests of those who do not need the law.

Toronto is the only place in Canada where a minimum wage law has been adopted. In that city, the recently adopted a minimum wage of \$15 a week for male workers, and have fixed a similar rate for women.
