Observed Memorial Day.
Washington, June 1.—President Roosevelt and thousands of Washingtonians participated in the observance of Memorial Day.

All Government departments and the principal business houses were closed, appropriate services were held at Arlington and all the other cemeteries in the vicinity of this city. A boat laden with flowers was set adrift on the Potomac river in tribute to the head of the navy, and there was a parade of military organizations and patriotic bodies.

Legislature Prorogued.
Frederickton, N.B., June 2.—The New Brunswick Legislature prorogued on Saturday. The most important legislation enacted was the Workmen's Compensation, Highway and Audit Acts. Seven thousand five hundred was voted to the Quebec Battlefield Fund.

Last in the Woods.
Peterboro, June 1.—Word has been received here of the terrible experience of a Peterboro man in the forests of Algoma. His name is Samuel Long, and he was employed as cook in a lumber camp in Algoma. Leaving the camp on a fishing expedition, he lost his way, and for 16 days wandered about in the woods without food. At the end of the tenth day his boots gave out, and he tore pieces of his trousers and shirt and wrapped them about his feet. At the end of 16 days, on May 25, he came to a lumber camp and was looked after. Long has a wife and family residing here.

Threat of Chicago Union Men.
Chicago, June 1.—Every union carpenter on all building operations affected by the sweeping injunction of Judge Carpenter's court will lay down his tools the instant one of their number is arrested, and remain on strike every day of the prisoner's incarceration. This is a "secret" agreement affecting 10,000 union carpenters and which will be invoked if sentences on three labor leaders for contempt of court is carried out. It is said that habeas corpus writs may be issued by another court saving from imprisonment the men sentenced by Judge Carpenter. There is a strong probability, however, that Daniel Gavin, secretary-treasurer of the carpenters' district council, alone will be punished.

To Exploit Bermuda.
Ottawa, June 1.—A Montreal company, in which the Allans are interested, has been incorporated to develop the resources of Bermuda, to establish public works and conveniences, including tramways, etc., and to carry on a shipping and importing business.
