The present session is the second one of the local association and everything would indicate a successful career for the organization. The old officers were re-elected and are: Pres., Mr. James Storor, of Lindsay, vice-pres., Mr. Hand, of Fenelon Falls, secretary-treasurer, Mr. H. A. Noble, of Crosswell.

APPLE REPORT

Important Information for Apple Growers and Shippers in This District. The following is an extract from the report of the Canadian Cargo Inspector at Glasgow on apples grown in the Georgian Bay district. "The condition of the apples was good, but the fruit running so small told very much against the market's estimate of its value. Owing to the scarcity of apples in the market the general opinion was that these would bring 25 to 30 shillings per barrel. After being opened they sold for only 23 shillings. It is of course understood that all Ontario apples were smaller than usual last year. Nevertheless the growers of winter apples in the Georgian Bay district need to be reminded that they have the best keeping apples in the world and on that account apples that will always bring the highest price for their variety one of the defects is their small size. Even in ordinary years we have frequently reports that the apples from the Georgian Bay district would have brought a higher price had they been larger. The lesson to be learned is that the growers in this district must take all the precautions possible for securing larger size. This can readily be done by fertilizing more highly and by cultivating the orchards more frequently. Of course spraying helps even in the matter of size because a tree that is infested with fungus cannot elaborate the material to make large sized fruit, so that spraying is a very important element in securing size. The Georgian Bay apple growers therefore, need to be reminded that clean culture and an abundance of fertilizer and thorough spraying are necessary to correct the one fault of their apples, lack of size. But this good culture, even if size were not the main object, would pay in the larger quantities of fruit which growers would secure.

W. F. M. S.

Annual Meeting Held at Cannington on Thursday. The 26th annual meeting of the W. F. M. S. of the Presbytery of Lindsay took place in Cannington on Thursday last. There were three sessions, morning, afternoon and evening. Delegates were present from almost every auxiliary in Presbytery from Sebridget on the north to Sonya on the south and from Bobcaygeon on the east to Cannington on the west. Altogether about two hundred ladies were in attendance. Reports were presented by the different secretaries of the clothing sent to the Indians in the Northwest, of the literature, of the work of mission bands and of the general work of the society. The treasurer's report showed that over \$1800 had been raised during the year 1902. Dr. McKay, secretary of the Foreign Mission Committee, who has just returned from a fifteen months' trip round the world, when he visited all the mission fields of the Presbyterian church, was present and gave an address in the afternoon on "India" and in the evening on "The Revival in Korea," something of which he had been able to see. He told of his trip across the continent of Europe to Brindisi, where he took ship through the Mediterranean, Suez canal, the Indian ocean and his landing at Bombay. He had met, he said, an English officer on the ship who had for some years been resident in India. "So," he said to Dr. McKay, "you are going out to see the missions? Well! You won't see much, for there's not much being done." The first stop made by Dr. McKay, was at a Methodist mission just out of Bombay. Upon enquiry he found that in the one mission alone there were 20,000 Christian natives and this was only a sample of what he found everywhere. The English officer spent all his business hours in his own office and his leisure time in his own social circle and was in absolute ignorance of the work of the missionaries. Dr. McKay gave many samples of the brightness and cleverness of the native children in the schools. "They are as just as clever as we are if they only had the chance," he said. He told of a procession of 180 little girls from one of the schools coming out to meet him. With their soft clear olive complexions, their large dark eyes, their pearly white teeth and their pretty white costumes, they made a picture he would never forget. He had seen these same little girls at prayer, all in the same room and all praying aloud, but there was no confusion, only a sense of reverence and of power. "Some great change is coming to India," he said. "I cannot say just what it will be but just when it will come but it's coming, it's coming." He closed his address with a strong, earnest appeal to everyone present to work harder than ever before that the sooner all the world should hear the gospel of Christ. The next annual meeting will be held in Sunderland.

The Lost Man Still Alive

One party has stated that he saw the man go on the train at Reboro for Toronto and another reports that he is in Toronto and that he held conversation with him. He is supposed to have left his clothes by the river bank, donned a new suit and walked to Reboro. It is also rumored that his wife had been attempting to secure the insurance on him.

County Council Grants to Education Sums for the Higher Schools

Omamee and Lindsay Boards of Education Will Get \$655.92 and \$2,751.59 Respectively. To the High School at Omamee, \$655.92. To the Lindsay Collegiate Institute, \$2,751.59. The above shows the respective amounts for which the County Council is held responsible to the Board of Education at Omamee, for the High School there, and the Board of Education of Lindsay for the Collegiate Institute here; and is the result of a meeting held last night. These at the meeting included representatives of the County Council; Warden Dr. R. M. Mason, of Fenelon; Mr. James Graham, of Carden, and Mr. T. H. Watson, of Mariposa, Mr. Alex. Jackson, Mr. J. D. Flavell, members and Mr. Robt. Spicers, Secretary Treasurer, approved for the Lindsay Board of Education. The Omamee Board was not represented but its interests were well looked after. The object of the meeting was to arrive at some conclusion as to how much cash the County Council should be responsible for in the matter of county pupils who attend the different institutions of learning not within county jurisdiction. The meeting took place in the office of Mr. McNeillie, County treasurer.

J. J. Thompson Leaving Town Takes Charge of Kingston Y.M.C.A.

Physical Director J. J. Thompson of the local Y.M.C.A. leaves here on June 15th next to take charge of the physical department of the Kingston Y.M.C.A.
