Falling Off Only on Freight

Grand Trunk Official Explains Situation—Passenger Business is Good

"The decreases still bulk but business is picking up, nevertheless," was the comment of a Grand Trunk official, in discussing the trade situation with a reporter.

Passenger business is capital—greater, in fact, now than it was at this time last year. There will be a great rush, of course, in connection with the Tercentenary at Quebec. But the passenger business for May has been all that could be desired. Our passenger department was right when it estimated that the business this year would be as great, if not greater, than that of last. The falling off has been in freight. Wholesale prices have not been ordering from abroad, and there isn't a great demand in the country. Our steamers are arriving at this port quite light, which account, in turn, for idle cars on the railways.

NOT HARD HIT

"But," continued the official, "we are not suffering anything like what the railways in the United States are enduring."

"There we find men turned off, shops closed, wages reduced, and hundreds of thousands of men lying idle. At the same time, there are signs of recovery. Our reports indicate that conditions in the West are favorable for a splendid crop. One thing we are all figuring on, the result of the additional acreage under cultivation. During the past five or six years hundreds of thousands of emigrants have arrived in the country. The great bulk of them have taken up land in the Northwest. It is now that their labors should begin to show. It is calculated that a million acres have been added to the wheat area but most people think the addition is more than that. With the constant increase of the wheat area, the railway business, so far as this particular transportation is concerned, will be doubted. Idle cars are only a temporary condition. The Grand Trunk Pacific will find it difficult, before long, when it is complete and running in the West, to keep pace with the demand, and this notwithstanding the activity of the other lines."

Revision Court Holds Session

The Court of Revision held its regular meeting last Wednesday. Those present were Mayor Begg, Aldermen McGeough, Jordan and Wray, Deputy-Clerk Eves.

Wm. Aikens claimed his property was assessed too high, but it was allowed to stand.

Dr. Burrows' assessment was also allowed to remain as placed by the assessors.

Mr. C. Squier's taxes having been lowered for a number of years on account of bringing the pea factory to town, were again decreased.

Mr. Staples thought that he should not be taxed quite such a heavy business tax. Taking into consideration the number of houses that Mr. Staples has built the business tax was accordingly struck off, but his appeal for lowering his general taxes were not considered.

Mr. S. Garbraith's appeal for lowering his taxes was not considered.

It was decided that Madison Williams should pay the same as last year but no further reduction could be made.

No reduction was made in the Kennedy, Davis assessment.

Mr. E. Davis' request to have a slight error in his name corrected having made a difference in taxes, was granted.

Moved that no reduction of taxes be granted the Canadian Express Co.

Mr. F. H. Reid was entirely exempt from taxes owing to the educational pursuits which he followed.

Mr. Robt. McDonnell was refused any reduction in taxes.

In Mr. Murphy's assessment the assessor made a slight error in measurement and it was therefore decided that they should go over the matter again.

The assessment on Mr. Geo. Brummell's mill property was considered as quite reasonable and was therefore allowed to stand.

Mr. Sinclair withdrew his appeal.

Mr. C. Marsh's property near the English church, although lately church property was considered assessable now.

Owing to the measurements given by Mr. J. Sullivan being misunderstood the matter was allowed to stand until some future period.

The R. M. Beall Leather Co. tannery assessment was confirmed.

Too Close to the Saw

An unfortunate accident happened Thursday that will necessitate a few days' rest for Mr. John Winters, St. Peter-st., employed at Carew's mill.

Mr. Winters, who was stationed at one of the circular saws, while in the act of picking up a slab, let his fingers come too close to the saw, with the result that the tips of his third and fourth fingers on his right hand were cut off, leaving the nails intact. The injured man was hurried to Dr. McAlpine's, where the wound was dressed and the pain relieved.

An Early Gold Mine

An Egyptian mining center—probably worked as early as 2,500 B. C.—was in the Eastern Desert, between the Red Sea and the Nile. The lately discovered remains described by C. J. Alford include small irregular stano huts, arranged in groups of two or three to towns large enough for \$1,000 men. The ancient workings are buried in sand. The only vestiges of mining appliances are elliptical rubbing stones for coarse crushing and quartz mills for reducing the rock to a fine powder, ready for washing out the gold.

The Bridal Veil

In order that there may be no unnecessary haste at the last moment and no needless anxiety lest her veil is not worn at just the most becoming angle, the bride-to-be might carefully study her profile and the contour of her face some little time before the day set for her wedding, and have it definitely decided in what style the lace or net veil is to be adjusted to give it the best and most becoming effect.

There are as many different ways of adjusting a wedding veil as there are the diverse styles of hats fashionable at the one time, and there is the same danger of a stiffen of looking at her best if a high-crown street instead of a low, broad line across the pompadour is attempted, as there would be should she wear a mushroom instead of a saloon-shaped hat, or vice versa. Every veil, whether of lace or illusion, should be wired or gathered into the required shape, and the material draped so as not to be massed too thickly over the face, or in any one place.

A lace veil must naturally be draped somewhat differently from nets and while every bride who can wear a lace veil gives much the effect of that cloudlike illusion is almost invariably more becoming as a matter of some comfort to those brides not blessed with such a hairloom.

One of the newest arrangements of a veil is that which is fastened to the forehead by a small cluster of orange blossom, and this mode of wearing the veil fits in peculiarly well with the lines of the costumes of today. It too fits a small cluster of orange blossoms at each side, fastened in close to the hair, will often make the veil more becoming.

English brides still seem to prefer the veil gathered for a full cap, which, however, is apt to be very becoming. This effect can be obtained equally well in either lace or illusion. The simplest arrangement of the wedding veil and the one that is most generally worn, and more apt to be becoming than any other style, is the crown or tiana effect. This is obtained by the veil being gathered in and fastened firmly to the hair with a little peak in the centre, and against this orange blossoms are massed in little wreaths of tiana.

LINDSAY AS A MANUFACTURING CENTRE.

(By T. W. Sheffield.)

It is highly interesting to note the leader in the Lindsay Post of the 20 of May, under the title of "Let us boost Lindsay," which expression is very opportune now that the political business of the electors will shortly be settled. The call for energetic action in boosting up Lindsay as a manufacturing centre, will not be in vain if a title of the energy displayed in the political arena is now devoted to forming a committee of representative authorities and townsmen interested in the development of the town. The scheme should receive the endorsement of all residents and tradesmen as every working man brought into the town means so much extra revenue. I have visited most of the towns between Buffalo and the west and Montreal on the east, and for its size has seen no better situated town than Lindsay for developing its resources and advantages as a manufacturing centre. The main advantages to the casual observer being the splendid connection with the C.P.R. and the G.T.R. system. In conjunction with these main arteries of commerce there are the waterways of the Trent Navigation Company, the utility of which is open to considerable expansion, but this will no doubt be utilized to its highest capacity as the districts and industries grew along its course. Linked with these three main factors there is the river frontage with a plentiful supply of water for steam or manufacturing purposes, together with cheap land to suit all classes of industries with the further advantage of low rates, and electrical power the day load of which should compare favorably with any other district.

It may be interesting to note the "boosting policy" is widely adopted by many of the progressive towns in Great Britain, indeed it is also used by the leading railway companies. In the case of the towns the town clerk or any responsible official issues pamphlets, in which are given the main advantages for manufacturers, and when any new company is formed these are forwarded and even followed up by one of the committee or duly appointed representatives.

In this way some of the towns have induced large firms to build on the localities under their control, in some instances bringing in as many as a thousand hands. The railway companies do the same thing, giving special siding facilities and other inducements. It is worthy to note that although the main source of revenue of the town may come from the manufacturers, the living question is also dealt with and handsome souvenirs are published and forwarded on application, which give illustrations of the district together with full particulars relating to the residential aspects of the town.

The latter policy is also quite applicable to Lindsay with its beautiful lakes and scenery, which compare very favorably with many districts further afield, indeed for one who has had sufficient of the larger centres, I find Lindsay an ideal spot offering facilities for travel and change unequalled by many of the more advertised towns of Canada. There is no doubt if the manifold advantages of this town were known to the industrial and residential community, there would soon be a gradual influence of both. The disadvantages of building works in or near the large centres in Great Britain has been fully realized by the fact that some of the largest concerns are now building new factories or extensions in places that had hitherto been agricultural villages, with a small railway station in the vicinity, which has readily been enlarged or even removed to meet the demands of the care.

The same policy will no doubt be long adopted by some of the capitalists seeking new markets in Canada. And notwithstanding the freight charges between such centres as Toronto, will find, with me, ever increasing rates and labor disturbances in the large cities, it is highly beneficial for all concerned to take advantage of the facilities such places as Lindsay can offer.

BOOSTING LINDSAY

(To the Editor of The Post.)

Sir, — Your editorial advising the formation of a club or organization to "boost" Lindsay, read very well, and it apparently has touched some people, judging by the communications since, in your paper regarding the same. I presume by "boosting" you mean something done, that will bring people here to live. It is admitted that the only thing that will bring people here, is more factories, and the question arises, are we doing anything to encourage those that are here to enlarge, or even stay here? I think that I am well within the mark, when I say, that in the last 10 years there has been no agreement entered into by the town with any factory that has come here, or that has been enlarged that has not been deliberately broken, or sought to be broken or conditions attached that make the agreement worthless by the town. If two men make an agreement, it is generally carried out — why should the town not do the same? The last factory to come here — the Madison Williams Co. — are supposed to have exemption, but their assessment for school purposes alone, is nearly \$5,000 more than the plant actually cost, and in trying to get this made right, the company is told "to be satisfied" with what they are getting, in case they might lose it all. Does this strike you, Mr. Editor, as being honest? Another concern is in the same predicament, only the differences more glaring, the school tax being very little less, than the whole tax would be, were a proper assessment made. Several concerns that have come here, have mere verbal agreements, made with former Councils, but they have to come every year, hat in hand, and get something thrown at them, such as a bond would be thrown to a dog making them feel unnecessarily mean, when they are only asking for the fulfillment of the town's part of the bargain. There are men on our Court of Revision, who would scorn to be credited as mean whose word was not to be trusted, and who yet will, without a question, override a bargain made by former Councils. This reputation of our Council is known everywhere, and it is not long before prospective manufacturers know what are up against it. It is all very well, a king the citizens to "boost" the town. Any boosting in that line is generally done by the manufacturers who are already here, and the treatment that they themselves have been subjected to, is not of a nature to make them in any ways hilarious about recommending any others to come here and receive the same treatment. — Yours truly, HONESTY.

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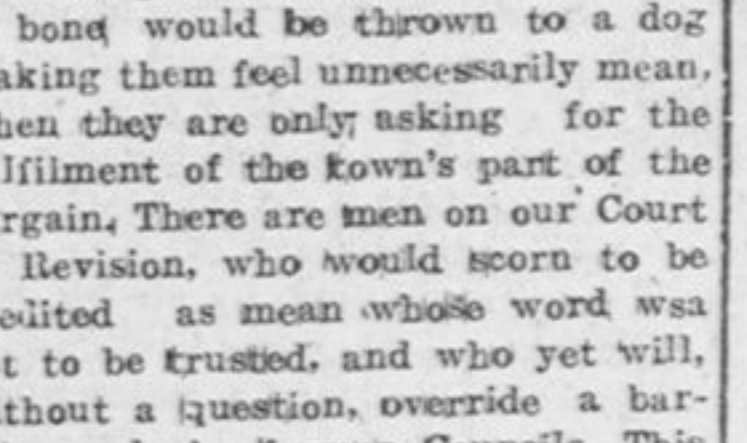
