Presentment of the Grand Jury

Punishment Should Not be Lessened for Crime Committed by one Intoxicated

The grand jurors of our Sovereign Lord the King assembled at the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, beg to make their presentment.

It is their first duty to refer to the decease of King Edward an event truly lamented by the whole Empire and by no one of its Dominions more than that of Canada.

They have visited the county gaol and found the premises in good order with the exception of the steps at the front entrance. They have been assured that this serious defect at the entrance is to be remedied without delay by the construction of granolithic steps and a substantial porch. There were three prisoners in the gaol, one serving sentence for a breach of the Liquor License Act one a vagrant and one undergoing sentence for obtaining goods under false pretences.

The lockup of the town of Lindsay was found in fair condition. The steps are too steep for the use for which they are intended, and consequently there is danger of injury from stumbling forward. The ceiling is stained from leakage of liquid from the floor of the horse stable above, and such a result should be prevented.

They would express their apprehension that in too many instances where crime is committed by persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor there is a tendency to make the condition of the person from this cause an excuse for lessening the punishment. They disapprove of such a course being pursued by the officials who are entrusted with the enforcement of the law.

They found the court house in an excellent condition of cleanliness and would express their appreciation of the admirable system of heating the county buildings which has been installed by the county council.

They have had pleasure in visiting the Ross Memorial Hospital and would express their gratification on finding that the institution is bestowing benefits on the community.

The House of Refuge was found to have as inmates 37 men and 22 women, a total of 54 persons. The house is in good condition, thoroughly clean and they found evidence that the inmates are well fed and their comfort fully provided for. The arm is well cultivated and they would mention especially the fine garden in connection with the house. It was a matter of surprise to them to find there is a slaughter house across the road from the House of Refuge and that on the occasion of their visit a very offensive odor was noticed as they entered the lane.

Rochester Man Was Arrested

Alleged Burglar Captured by Constable Thornbury in Kimmount Friday

Acting upon a telegram received from the Rochester police Friday morning asking for the arrest of a man named David Powncey who is alleged to have committed burglary and larceny in Rochester city, Constable Thornbury was sent to Kimmount to locate the man in question. Soon after the constable arrived, there it is said that Powncey had gone out into the country with a young lady. Following on the trail, the constable came in sight of the two, and shadowed them for about an hour as they were returning to Kimmount. When near the village the constable went and spoke to the man, calling him by name, to which he responded.

Constable Thornbury then made known his business, and the man was placed under arrest. He was brought to Lindsay on the evening train, and lodged in the county gaol.

Chief of Police Vincent advised the Rochester authorities of the arrest, and an officer is now on his way with the necessary papers.

The prisoner claims to be a Canadian, born in Hamilton. He is about 23 years of age, eighteen of which have been spent in the States. He is of good appearance and address. It is alleged that his undoing was brought about by a letter which is supposed to have been written by the lady in Kimmount.

The Scaffold Is Completed

But Henderson May Not Hang Next Thursday

Peterboro Review—The scaffold on which Robert Henderson is to meet his death, has been practically completed. A gang of four men has been working on the scaffold for some days past under the supervision of the official executioner. In spite of several enquiries at the Sheriff's office, the name of the hangman could not be found out and for the reasons the Review presumes, that he wants his identity concealed.

From a reliable source it is learned however, that the executioner is a man of middle size about fifty years of age and speaks with an English accent.

The scaffold is in the inner jail yard on the north side and about two feet of it may be seen above the jail wall. A portion of the rope was visible yesterday, but it will be impossible for the public to see any part of the execution as the boarding at the top will be arranged so as to prevent this.

The executioner has left the city, and will officiate at the hanging of Walter Ross at North Bay on the 21 arriving here from there for Henderson's execution on the 23rd.

A local young man who has been a prisoner in the jail until recently, on a minor charge, states that Henderson is just as indifferent in his attitude as reports would indicate. He shaved the condemned man on a couple of occasions and the latter remarked that his barber might as well cut his throat as let somebody else hang him.

The young man says that Henderson is a clever parodist and readily composes parodies on "Old Grey Bonnet" and other popular songs.

His counsel Mr. F. D. Kerr, is in Toronto trying to put forth his best endeavors to save a life, and he has succeeded in his initial step.

Yesterday, Mr. Kerr made initial application to the trial judge, Mr. Justice Riddell.

He obtained a reserve case.

A special court will be held at Osgoode Hall on Monday next, at which Mr. Kerr's exceptions, made at the trial here, will be heard.

The city authorities ceased last night the work of hunting for more victims, and The Herald took over the task this morning.

This morning a public funeral was held by the Typographical Union on behalf of 13 members.

Edinburgh, June 18.—William J. Bryan addressed the evening session of the World's Missionary Conference. He refuted many of the objections to missions and said that missionaries were much less apt to get nations into trouble than persons who went abroad for the purpose of making money.

Files Highest Yet.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 18.—Walter Brooks in a Wright biplane broke the world's aeroplane record for altitude yesterday, when he soared to a height of 4,500 feet. His motor stopped as he was descending and he made a glide of two miles, landing easily in a wheatfield.

Dry Transfers at Ottawa.

Ottawa, June 18.—A free distribution of saliva on Ottawa street cars is to cease. Supt. Hutcheson has ordered the conductors not to wet their finger tips when drawing a ticket or a transfer from a bunch. This order is being made at the request of the Board of Health.

Scott Going to England.

Ottawa, June 18.—W. D. Scott, commissioner of immigration, will sail for England on July 15. He will be absent about six weeks and will inspect the immigration offices of the British Isles.

Drink Caused This Man's Death

Alexandria, Ont., June 18.—Postmaster E. A. Newton of Fassifern cut his throat yesterday morning at two o'clock with a razor, and expired immediately.

Deceased was 37 years of age, married, and removed from Montreal to Fassifern about three years ago, where he purchased a store. He had been drinking heavily.

A couple of neighbors were spending Thursday night watching him. About two o'clock Newman got up and went to a bureau drawer evidently to get a cigar but actually to secure a razor. Showing it to the guards, he blew out the lamp, and before they could realize the situation, he had cut his throat.

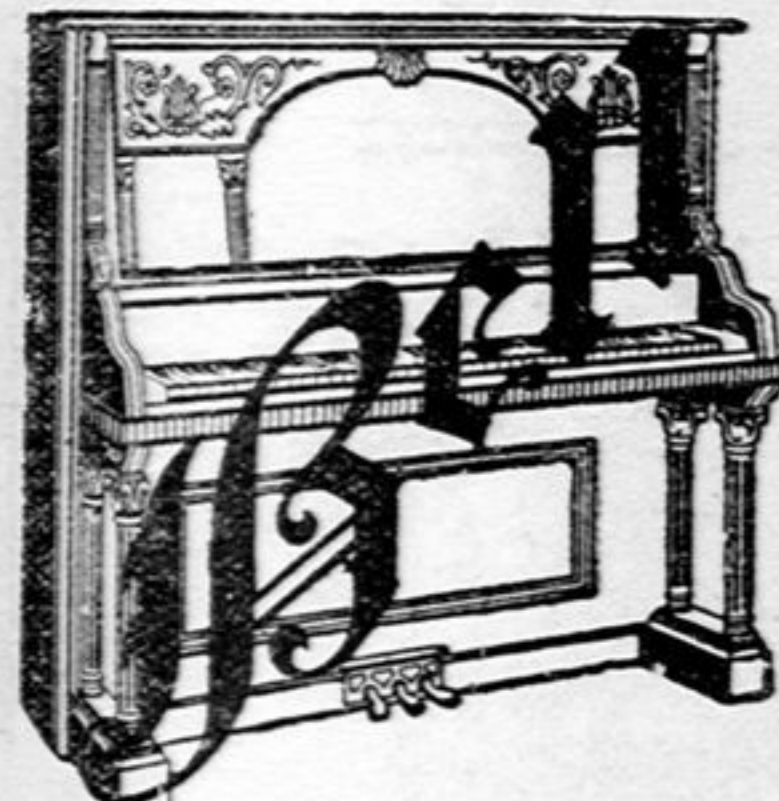
Prominent grain men here believe that the Dominion Government will shortly step in and take over all the terminal elevators.
