ADVANCEMENT OF SCIENCE

The Kaiser Has Honored the Members of a New Institute

Members of the new institute for the advancement of science, which was created by the Kaiser last October, have had a number of extraordinary insignia conferred upon them. Shortly after the inauguration of the institute the Kaiser decreed to them a dark green uniform, heavily embroidered with gold and faced with purple velvet. They are now to wear a medalion portrait of the Kaiser fastened on their breasts. But the most remarkable ornament is that which the Kaiser has conferred upon the President of the institute, Dr. Harnack, the well-known Professor of Church History and Dogma. This is an elaborate neck-chain, richly enamelled in Renaissance style, and having as links alteration forget-me-nots and female heads. Suspended from the chain is a heraldic eagle of brilliant coloring and an enamel medalion of the Kaiser surrounded by a laurel wreath. Dr. Harnack may safely say that the president of no other learned body in the world has a chain like his.

MOORS IN REVOLT

An International Army May Be Used Against the Tribesmen

Paris, Mar. 7.—All of Morocco is in revolt against the Sultan. Fez, the capital, and Tangier, are cut off from the outside world. The revolt is spreading against foreigners, and the International patrol army of French, German and Spanish troops may unite to put it down. Reports received from the Moroccan coast ports to-day stated that the insurrection is spreading to all the tribes formerly friendly. The Sultan's troops are in retreat, and it is reported that 300 have been killed in several conflicts.

RUEF GOES TO PRISON

Chicago, Mar. 7.—Abe Ruef, the convicted political boss, will probably be taken to San Francisco prison to-day to begin his fourteen-year term for bribing Supervisor Purye.

Ruef has lost his appeal to the supreme court. He had asked for a stay of sentence, and his only chance now is an appeal to the federal courts.

AMBASSADOR BRYCE COMING

Ottawa, Mar. 7.—It was announced to-day that Ambassador Bryce will arrive in Ottawa from Washington on Friday. He will be the guest of Earl Grey. In view of the connection of the Ambassador with the reciprocity negotiations at Washington his coming to Ottawa at this time gives rise to some speculation.

FIRST AID

PASSENGER TRAINS WITHIN A MONTH

News Letter: It is expected that the C.P.R. will be running their regular passenger service into Orillia via Coldwater by or before the end of June.

The time between Orillia and Toronto on the C.P.R. will be about three and a half hours, the afternoon train leaving here about 1.15 will arrive in Toronto at 4.50. The evening train coming from Toronto, leaves at 6.15, and will reach Orillia before ten o'clock. The fare will be the same as on the G.T.R., \$2.60. The C.P.R. telegraph line between Orillia and Coldwater is now under construction, and will be finished in two weeks, when messages can be sent out from Orillia over their line. The telegraph office will be located in the present C.P.R. ticket office of Messrs. James and Horne. They will also look after and handle C.P.R. express.

MOUJIK WEDDING FEAST

Peasants Give Themselves Up to the Enjoyments of the Occasion

When the day's work is done the Russian moujik's recreations are of the simplest. Perhaps he dances, or plays the concertina, or sings some melancholy air. But when a wedding has to be celebrated, and the priest has duly united the couple, the peasants give themselves up to the enjoyments of the occasion.

The writer well remembers peeping into the brightly-lit rooms of a tiny two-roomed log-cabin where such a revel was in progress. The evening was a hot one. In one room, so small that only four couples could with difficulty wheel about, dancing was in progress. The perspiring couples had made up their minds to enjoy themselves. There was a kind of determined-to-see-it-through look on their faces, and evidently they had great staying powers (says a writer in Chambers' Journal). In the same room, closely packed and lining the walls, were onlookers waiting till a couple should drop out to take their place in the dance.

The second apartment was laid out with refreshments. A side-table groined with all kinds of dishes dear to the peasant palate. One knife, one table napkin, one fork, did service for the party; but some scorned even these aids, and picked up here a rind, there a hunch of melon, or tore at a hard sausage.

One tall man, was pointed out as the stationmaster of a tiny wayside station near by. He was conspicuous as being better groomed and less savage in appearance than his fellows, and one heard afterwards that the seductive charms of a wedding feast made him forget on that evening his duty as a signalman. Result: Two months afterwards the stationmaster, for neglect of duty in his capacity of signalman, is degraded to a charge at a smaller station.
