MAN KILLED BY TRAIN IN CALIFORNIA SAID TO BE RESIDENT OF LINDSAY

Acting Postmaster Palen has received the following communication concerning the death of Malcom McArthur in California.

To the Postmaster, at Lindsay Ontario, Canada.

Dear Sir,— On the eleventh of this month a man was run over and killed near Clipper Gap in this county, by a freight train on the Southern Pacific railroad. I found in his pocket a Poil Tax Receipt dated, March 26, 1910, at the Vina Ranch, Tehama County, California. The tax receipt was issued by J. McArthur, and on the back of the receipt was written (I presume in his own hand writing) the following: My name is Malcom McArthur, My home is in Lindsay, Ont. Canada, (and then there is something written which is so blured that I cannot make out.) and Archie N. McArthur, Lindsay, Ont. Canada."

I had the Undertakers, Messers, 'Walsh and Meener' wire to Archie, bgt received word back that he had left there. So I thought I would write you these few lines, and you may hand this to some news paper man of your city, and let him publish it as a new item. Perhaps some of his relations will see it and thereby know what has become of Joe McArthur. That is the name he went by at the Vina Ranch. I wrote to the Superintendent of the ranch, and he said his name on their books was J. McArthur, and he worked for them for several months but that was all they knew about him.

Will Open Eight Model Schools

It has been decided by the Educational Department that the eight new model schools of the province are to be located at Athens, Bracebridge, Chatham, Clinton, Guelph, Morrisburg, Napanee and Perth. The six model schools which survived the establishment of the Faculty of Education at the universities a few years ago and the increase in Normal schools were those at Cornwall, Durham, Kingston, Orillia, Rensselaer and North Bay. These with the eight new schools make up a provincial model school system of 14 schools well distributed throughout the Province.

All the model schools will re-open on September 5th for the school season 1911-1912. "PUBLIC" TO "MODEL." The News was informed at the Department of Education this morning that the establishment of the new schools meant simply the conversion of one public school in each town or city into a model school. The principals and staffs of the various schools will remain unchanged for the present at least.

CARE OF CLOTHES

Teach Children to Look After Their Clothing Properly Many a woman who is an expert in the cleaning of paint, and who has taught her children correct table manners, has neglected to teach them to care for their clothes properly, and, indeed, many women do not seem to understand that process. How many throw their clothes down on a chair when they take them off at night? True, they may fold them, but the neatly folded garments laid on top of each other on the back of a chair become creased, and are not properly aired. When the garments which have been worn next to the body, and have necessarily absorbed the moisture from the pores, are removed, they should be hung where there is a circulation of air, that they may be properly dried and aired. Hang up the garments, letting them get thoroughly dry and aired before putting them on again, or before putting them away in the cupboards or the drawers. When one gives the matter a moment's thought it will readily be seen how untidy and insanitary it is to treat the garments as many people do, throwing them down in an unsuited heap during the night, and putting them on again in the morning. Another bit of advice in regard to the care of the clothes is to remove any grease-spots immediately on taking off the gown. Rub it at once with some French chalk, rubbing the chalk on the soiled spot lightly, and letting the garment lay overnight in the chalk, then shaking it off the next day. Magnesia may be used instead of the chalk; but whichever you select, remember that the best way to treat a white garment is to rub it with chalk or magnesia when you take it off, fold it in blue tissue-paper, and lay it away in the big box or drawer until you want to wear it, then shake out the chalk. You will be surprised to know how long a white blouse may be worn without sending it to the cleaner if you treat it in this way.

700 MILES OF FENCE

C.P.R. Will Use 5,000 Miles of Wire in Prairie Provinces Over 5,000 miles of wire will be used by the Canadian Pacific this year in building new fences along their lines in the prairie provinces. This quantity of wire will build 700 miles of fence, which is the amount suggested for the work of the year. The fences are seven strands high, the wire used being the class without barbs.

Some of the old fences will be replaced, but for the most part the wire will be used in the construction of fences where there are none at the present time. The work of building is done by contract; the company supply the posts, the contractors supplying the wire and doing the work. This latter will be done by one of the local companies.
