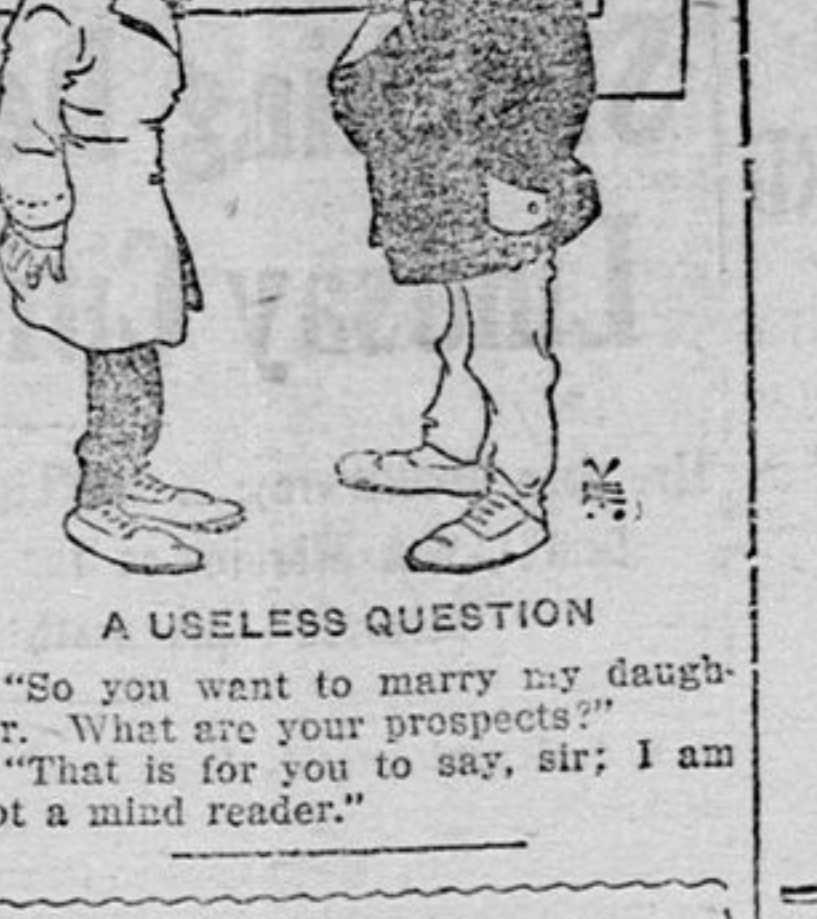
Increase of 90,000 in Great Britain Since Last Election

Rich Christmas Pudding

Mix together a pound of chopped beef suet, ten ounces of bread-crumbs, four ounces of sifted flour and two of corn-flour, twelve ounces each of stoned raisins and picked dried currants, half a pound of cleaned and dried candied peel, a quarter of a pound of glass cherries, three ounces of blanched almonds, a pound of sugar, a tablespoonful of salt, nutmeg, ginger, and cinnamon. When thoroughly amalgamated, add gradually six eggs beaten with a quarter of a pint each of rum and brandy. Stir thoroughly. Boil for twelve hours.

How to Prepare Lobster

After removing the lobster from the boiling water, drain and wipe dry. When cool split open the body and tail and crack the claws, to extract the meat. The sand-pouch found near the throat should be removed, as also the head and what are termed the lady-fingers. Care should likewise be exercised in removing all feathery, gill-like particles formed about the sides of the body, as they are tough, very indigestible, and cause much trouble. They are thought by some to be reprehensible for the so-called poisoning from eating lobster.

Children's Christmas Pudding

Boil three-quarters of a pound of potatoes in the usual way, drain, dry them, and set them aside to cool. Prepare half a pound of carrots in the same way. When quite cool, mash the vegetables as smoothly as you can and place in a large basin, together with half a pound of flour, an equal weight each of bread-crumbs and chopped suet, a pound each of currants and prepared raisins, twelve ounces of sugar, two ounces of mixed peel, a large cooking apple grated, half a teaspoonful of salt, and the same amount of mixed spice. Mix thoroughly. Beat two eggs, stir in a heaping tablespoonful of treacle, and add to the other ingredients. Boil for nine hours.
