Big Plant for Hamilton. Hamilton, June 4.-The report of

E. J. Sifton, the electrical expert en gaged by the city to formulate a plan and prepare estimates on Hamilton's proposed municipal light and power system, was given out yesterday.

Mr. Sifton's report provides for a complete plant, ready for operation street, commercial and residence Tighting and power supply of 1,000 Zeersepower at a total cost of \$502,-It is estimated that 3,051 h.p. be required from the Hydro-Elec-Commission. The estimates are on the city's needs in 1914, when the present contract with the Cataract Company expires.


MRS. E. ST. THOMAS.

SECLUDED WOMEN

Curious Experiences In India-How Evidence is Given by Women In Court

Sir Andrew Fraser, ex-Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, tells some curious stories in his book, "Among Indian Rajahs and Ryots."

While hearing a civil case in which a lady of considerable property was required to give evidence, "a day was fixed, and she was brought to Court. She came in a palaki or palanquin, which, despite its name, was nothing else than a very small and uncomfortable box carried on a bamboo pole. One could hardly understand how it was possible for her to be in it without great discomfort. It had been carried into a room of the Zenana and laid down. After all the men had gone away, she had come, att nded by her women, and had stepped into it. The thick curtain that covered one side of the box (all the rest being of wood) was then dropped and securely fastened. Her nearest male relative stood by while the box was removed from her room, and walked with it through the streets. When it was brought into the Court, it was laid down, but not opened. I asked the counsel on both sides whether they were satisfied that the lady inside the box was the witness whom it was desired to examine. After conversing with those who had accompanied her, and addressing a question or two to the lady, they replied that they were satisfied. I then put car-'tain questions to her; and she an-


DARING BRIDGE BUILDERS

> Christmas Pudding (American Recipe).

Required: One pound of chopped beef suet, half a pound of dry, of stoned raisins, a pound of mixed candled peel, shredded, half a pound of breadcrumbs, one pound of sultanas, and one pound of cleaned and dried picked currants. Mix all these ingredients in the order given. Break eight eggs into a basin, beat them for at least ten minutes, strain them, mix in a quarter of a pint of brandy, and stir into the dry ingredients. Stir for quarter of an hour at the very least. Boil in a well-buttered basin tied down with a floured cloth for thirteen or fourteen hours.

Christmas Pudding

(Australian Recipe). Mix together a pound of breadcrumbs, two ounces of flour, twelve properly prepared, four ounces of mixed candled peel, shredded, a dessertspoonful of mixed spice, and half a grated nutmeg. Put three large tablespoonfuls of treacle into a cup and stand it in a basin of hot water until it is quite warm. Stir into the dry ingredients and mix well. Cover with a cloth and leave in a warm place for three hours. Beat the yolks of eight eggs, and add. Whip the whites of thee ggs as stiffly as possible, stir them well in, and pour into a buttered basin. Boil for eight hours
