COLLEGIATE TEACHER'S SALARIES RAISED

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held last night with the following members present, Messrs Stewart, (chairman), Jackson, Anderson, Carew, Campbell, Wood, Staples, Blanchard, Flavell, and White. Principal Kirkconnell's report for May, showed that 262 had been in attendance, with an average attendance of 254. The flag pole on the roof of the Collegiate was in bad need of repairs, and a new flag was also needed. The teacher's room to be complete needed furniture. These matters will all be attended to.

The attendance at the Public schools in May read from Principal McDougall's report was 363, with an average attendance of 795.

A communication was read from Mr. J. G. Edwards, of town suggesting the engaging of a practical science master for the public schools. It was felt that this was an excellent idea, and the secretary was instructed to reply to the effect that the matter would be held under consideration.

A letter from the Bell Telephone Company had been received re the installing of instruments in the houses of the principals. The rate would be \$18.00 per telephone. The matter will be discussed by the Principals and brought up at the next meeting.

Mr. G. A. Manning, of the Collegiate staff, had wrote the council asking for a raise of \$100. It was thought that Mr. Manning's work during the past year showed that he was deserving of the raise in his salary. His salary will now be \$1200.

Resignations were handed in by Misses A. E. Bruce, M. E. Briscoe, H. L. Lambert and G. Watson. The resignations were accepted, and new teachers will be advertised for at once. The following teachers will receive a raise of \$50.00, Misses Wray Twamley, Fee, M. Woods, Weldon, Smith, Graham, Eagleton, A. V. Woods, and Gouinlock.

As a new assistant teacher at the Collegiate, Mr. Archibald was engaged, duties to commence Sept 1st.

The estimated receipts and expenditures for 1911 were then read by Mr. Jackson.

CHANGES MADE BY COUNCIL

Finance Committee.—The auditor's report was read and stated that the finances and accounts were in excellent shape. The cash surplus for the year was about \$900. It was felt that in order to raise money for bridge-building purposes, the assessment rate should be raised instead of increasing debentures. Two and one half mills were levied for this purpose.

Roads and Bridge Committee. Quite a discussion arose over the liability assumed by the council over the Little Bob bridge at Bobcaygeon. The upshot of the matter, was that a committee, composed of the warden, Dr. Sims and Mr. Devitt was formed to look into the matter.

The road leading to Ops swing bridge is in a dangerous condition because it is so narrow. If a rig and an automobile were to meet at this narrow afternoon's session of the County Council was taken up with committee work.

The committee, on education, decided that nothing should be done about making the Lindsay Collegiate Institute a county institution until the November session of the council. In Laxton County and in school section No. 3, where a new school had been built, a grant of fifty dollars was row approach, an accident would be very liable as there is not room for both to pass. The drop on each side is about four feet. The matter will be looked into and remedied.

Power was given to the warden of Ops to make any necessary repairs to Brown's Bridge.

On lot 9 in rear of con. 9, the bridge has unken considerably on account of spring floods. The bridge is not a county bridge, but it is a main road that should be fixed. The representative from this district would be satisfied if a grant of \$300 would be given towards it while the township would raise the remainder. Instead of the grant, however, a committee of the warden, Mr. Varcoe and Mr. Steele was formed to look into the matter, and act as they thought best. They are authorized to pay 2-3 of the cost.

In concession, 1, Dalton, A great washout occurs every year, which makes it particularly impossible for travel. The road is covered thus, for nearly half a mile. A grant of fifty dollars was voted towards the building of a culvert.

The piers of Rosedale bridge had shifted considerably. The Government engineer had been there and had repaired that although the bridge seemed safe enough at present it should be attended to before long. Accordingly, Mr. Talmie was given power to go ahead and see that the bridge was put in a satisfactory condition.

The approaches and piers of the Cobocoon bridge were also in bad condition. Mr. Callan, the warden, will look after this matter.

Forrest House bridge will be re-floored by means of laying cedar plank lengthwise on the cedar floor.

Mr. R. J. Mitchell lost his cant hook at Emily Creek Bridge not long ago. He is now looking for settlement. A new hook will be bought for him.

The approaches to Gold Creek Bridge near Victoria Road will be attended to.

On lots 20 and 21 con. 4, Mariposa, there is a bridge over 300 ft. long and because of its length the county should therefore share a part of the burden for maintenance. The bridge is travelled a great deal by townspeople. The warden, Mr. Hocken, and Mr. Steele, were appointed to look into the matter.

Big Fruit Year.

St. Catharines, June 12.—It was the tenth of June last year when the first home-grown strawberries made their appearance on the market. This year they are earlier by ten days and today the St. Catharines Cold Storage & Forwarding Co. will make the first carload shipment of the year to Winnipeg and the west.

The fruit season this year will be longer than any for several years past because it has begun so early. Cherries will be on the market during the week and from now on there will be little let-up for the growers.

Robert Thompson, who enjoys the distinction of being the best informed man in the district, is authority for the statement that the crop this year is the largest the Niagara District has had in a decade. Everything, he says, is very plentiful, peaches are too plentiful and will have to be thinned out to make the crop what it should be; otherwise the fruit will be small and the growers will get less benefit. The only shortage that is so far apparent is in the Marlborough raspberries, which will be much lighter than usual, though the shortage is not general to all localities.

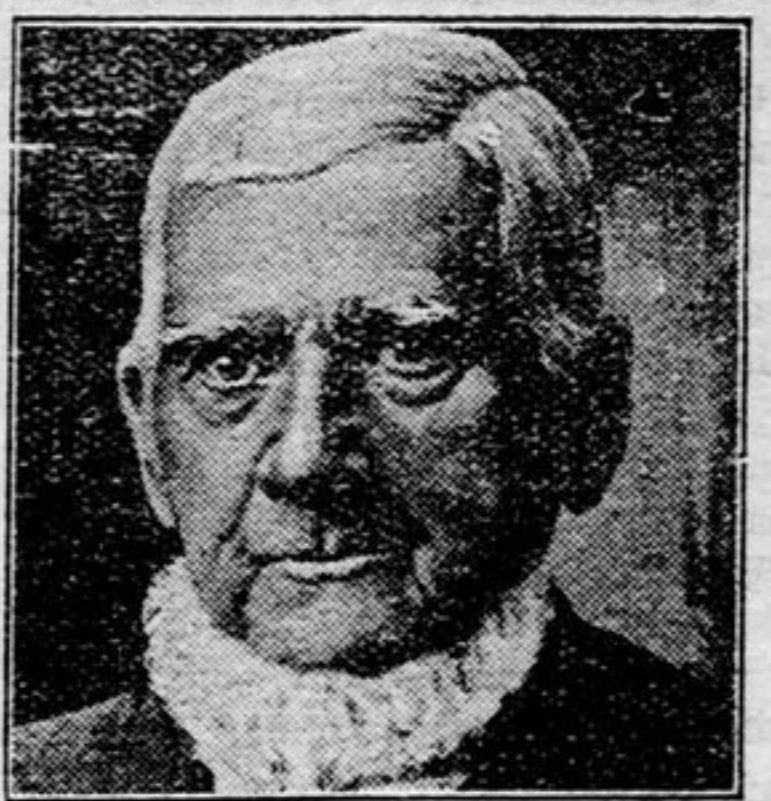

The parents live on Foundry street, and the mother is critically ill. This is the second son they have lost by accidental death, a younger boy having been drowned in the river at Bridgeport.

WM. J. LINDSAY GAVE HIMSELF UP

(Special to the Post.)

Toronto, June 12.—The much heralded return of William J. Lindsay, who acted as stock selling agent for the defunct Farmers' Bank, has at last come to pass. Saturday morning, while police court was still in progress, he walked into Inspector of Detectives Duncan's office and gave himself up to face the charges which have been laid against him in connection with the bank.

He is charged with conspiring with the provisional directors, J. R. Stratton, M.P., C. H. Smith and Dr. Beatrice Nesbitt, to secure the certificate of the Treasury Board of Canada enabling the bank to commence business. On Saturday no one seemed to know exactly his position in this matter. No available record showed whether he had been indicted with the others by the grand jury of the assizes in May. The cases of the others are traversed to the next sittings of that court.

Mr. Corley, however, made an order for bail in the sum of \$4,000, and Lindsay's own bond in that amount. Bondsmen were secured late in the afternoon.

He appears in the Police Court today, when it is understood that the Attorney-General's Department will be present to speak to the laying of information for alleged securing of stock subscriptions from Halton County farmers by fraud and securing commissions from the bank for such subscriptions, which were later repudiated.

Lindsay's fingerprints, photograph and Bertillon measurements were taken on Saturday.

PRINCE OF WALES NOW GARTER KNIGHT

London, June 12.—The first of the great state functions arose with the coronation of King George V, was witnessed Saturday at Windsor Castle, where the Prince of Wales was invested with the insignia of the Order of the Garter.

The elaborate ceremonial, dating from the institution of the order 500 years ago, was conducted in the throne room. King George and Queen Mary, with the knights of the order, attended in gorgeous robes, and full insignia of the order. The King himself buckled the blue velvet garter on the left leg of the youthful knight.

Following the investiture a brief religious service was held at St. George's Chapel, and the King and Queen and knights then returned in procession to the castle. The ceremony was private, but the boys from Eton, the civic authorities of Windsor and a few privileged ones were permitted to view the procession.

The investiture was a very brilliant function, the ceremony including a grand procession of knights in their robes. The knights wore full regalia, including the large plumed hats, more than a foot in height, which have been worn only on rare occasions.

The King himself buckled the garter on the prince's left leg, affixed the ribbon and the George on the left shoulder, fastened the star of the order to the left breast and handed his royal highness the collar.

During the investiture the prelate of the order, the Bishop of Winchester, pronounced the following quaint admonition: "To honor God omnipotent and in memorial of the blessed Martyr St. George, tie about thy leg for thy renown, this noble garter. Wear it as a symbol of the most illustrious order, never to be forgotten or laid aside, that thereby thou mayst be admonished to be courageous, and having undertaken any just war in which thou shalt be engaged, that thou mayst stand firm, valiantly, fight successfully and conquer."

County Judge Hatton died at Owen Sound yesterday.

The strike of coal porters in Britain is seriously threatening shipping.

The body of Charles McMahon of Midland, murdered at Ashland, Wis., was brought home and interred yesterday.

West Northumberland Conservatives nominated Mr. C. A. Munson for the Commons and Capt. Hugh McCulloch for the Legislature.

The first aviation fatality in Austria occurred yesterday at Vienne-Neustadt. Vincenz Wiesenbach of Luxemburg was killed by a fall of fifty feet from a monoplane of his own invention.

The delegates in attendance at the convention of the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Durham Saturday tendered J. H. Devitt, M.P., the unanimous nomination for the coming provincial election.

The second turbine battleship of the German navy, the Frederick the Great, was launched here on Saturday, being christened by Princess Auguste Wilhelm. The dedicatory address was delivered by Gen. von der Goltz.

Quebec was the scene of another destructive fire yesterday morning, when the extensive premises of the Imperial Laundry in St. Valier street, were badly wrecked. Three horses were suffocated, and four others had to be destroyed.
