The fruit season this year will be longer than any for several years past because it has begun so early. Cherries will be on the market during the week and from now on there will be little let-up for the growers.



The elaborate ceremonial, dating from the institution of the order 560 years ago, was conducted in the throne room. King George and Queen Mary, with the knights of the order, attended in gorgeous robes, and full insignia of the order.
