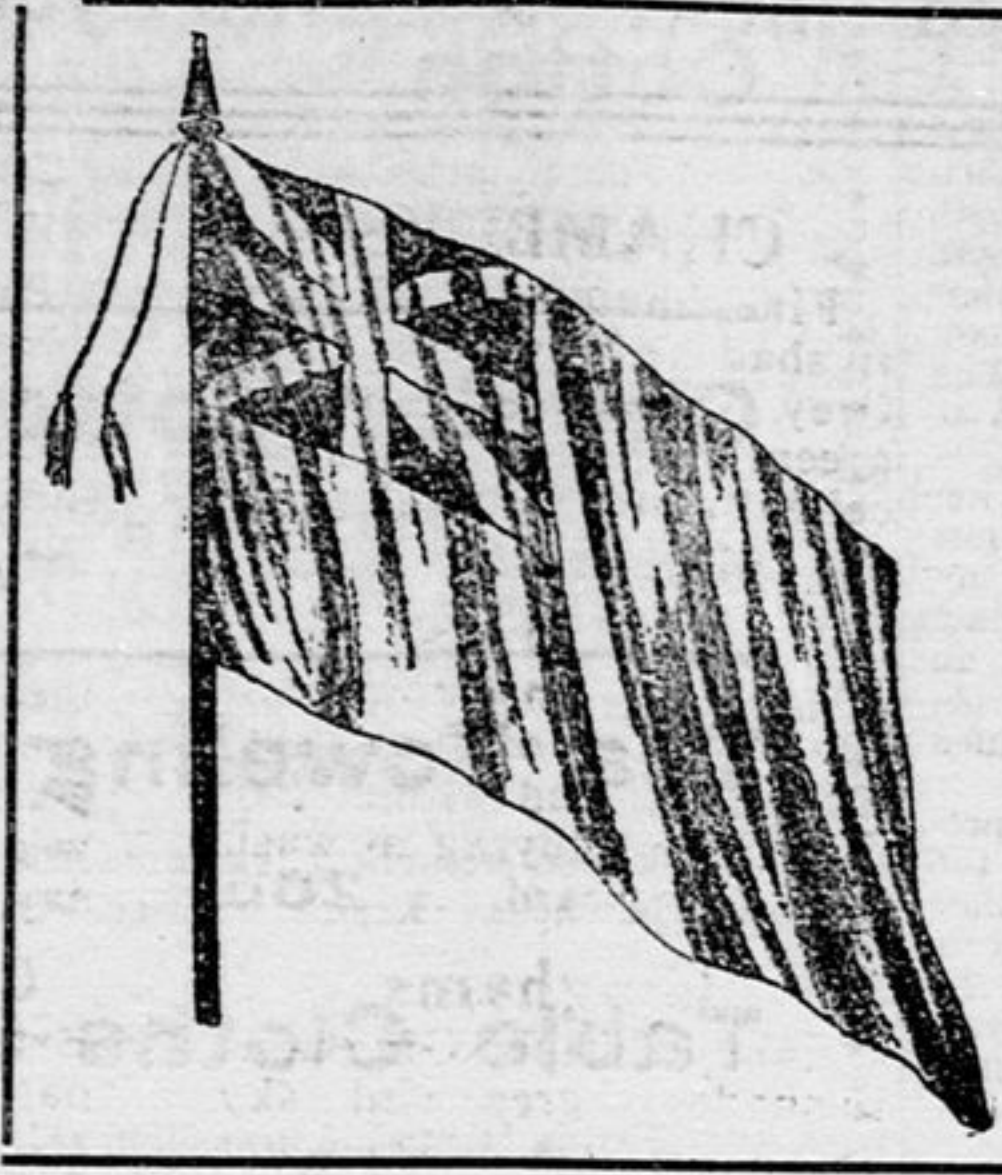

FINING DRUNKARDS

In an address to the city council, of Titusville, Pa., Mayor Dickerson, spoke strongly on the absurdity of fining drunkards, who appeared in court. This practice has been the subject of a good deal of adverse criticism from those who have considered the matter from the standpoint of those dependent on drunkards for support as well as from the standpoint of the state and of the men themselves. Mr. Dickerson, in his remarks to the council, said:

"Almost every dollar received at that source takes away some comfort, if not necessity, from innocent women and children. Assuredly, taking a few dollars from a household to pay for an imaginary injury to the municipality by an intoxicated individual is poor recompensation. It would seem more like justice to me if the police were empowered to search a defendant and send any money they find to the wife and mother."

It does not seem that this method of punishing drunkards is in keeping with his crime, and it certainly is a hardship on wives, the mothers and families of the unfortunate man.
