Douglas lived at Quyon, Que., for several years. He was convicted of fraudulent practices on farmers near Cobourg. His methods was to represent himself as a Scotland Yard detective and undertake to find fortunes for unsuspecting victims, supposed to have been left to them by unknown relatives in Australia, South Africa and other parts of the world.
