CHICAGO, June 4.—Sprinkles of rain today at scattered points in Nebraska and Kansas disturbed to some extent the confidence of wheat bulls, who have been acting on reports of severe crop damage, the result of heat and drought. In consequence, the market, although closing with a net gain of 1/4c to 3/8c, had a rather weak zone. Corn wound up at an advance of 1/4c to 1/2c, and oats dearer by 3/8c to 1/2c. The outcome in provisions was 7/8c to 1 1/2c decline in the market.
