PROCEEDINGS OF ELDON COUNCIL

Council met as a Court of Revision of the Assessment roll of 1912, at McKenzie's hall, Kirkfield, on Saturday, June 1st.

Moran—McRae—That Reeve Steele be appointed chairman of the Court of Revision.—Carried.

The following appeals were heard: Russell and John McLeod appealed to be assessed as owners of part of lot 1, con. 4, instead of Wm. Moore.

Neil McEachern appealed to have W. pt. lot 5, con. 10 assessed to John Gilchrist instead of him as he had moved off said place.

Neil McEachern appealed to have a dog struck off the roll as it had been killed.

Chas. E. Ross appealed against the assessment of N. 1/2 lot 5, con. 7, as being assessed too high.

B. Stacey appealed to have one dog struck off the roll as it had been killed.

Chas. E. Ross, sworn, stated his property was assessed too high, as compared with neighboring properties. Assessor stated that he considered he had assessed buildings about \$200 too high.

Moran—McRae—That assessment of buildings of Chas. Ross on N. 1/2 lot 5, con. 7 be reduced \$200.—Carried.

McRae—A. D. McEachern—That Jos. W. Staples be assessed as tenant for lot 7, con. 4. That name of C. E. McDonald be struck off roll and that K. A. McInnes be assessed for lot 15, con. 7 at \$1000 and that Chas. Campbell be assessed for N. W. 1/4 lot 15, con. 7, at \$700. That name of Philip Smith be added as M. F. on N. 1/2 lot 7, con. 3. That Robert Davidson be assessed as tenant on lot 5, con. 3. That name of W. W. Moore be struck off roll and names of Russell and John McLeod be substituted as owners of W. 1/2 lot 1, con. 4. That name of Joseph Lee be added as tenant of lot 3 north side of Nelson st., Kirkfield. That name of Neil McEachern be struck off roll and that name of John Gilchrist be substituted as owner of W. pt. of lot 5, con. 10 and name of A. N. Campbell be substituted as owner of S. E. cor. lot 6, con. 9.—Carried.

W. F. McEachern—A. D. McEachern—That John Reid be assessed as tenant for lots 5 and 6 Queen st. Lorneville land \$100 and buildings \$25.—Carried.

A. D. McEachern—W. F. McEachern—That the roll of 1912 as amended by the Court of Revision be confirmed and that the court now adjourn.—Carried.

McRae—Moran—That members of Court of Revision do now resolve themselves into ordinary members of municipal council to transact business of the township.—Carried.

McRae—W. F. McEachern—That the minutes of meeting of April 20th as read be adopted.—Carried.

John Sutherland, notice of his intention to erect 50 rods wire fence on W. side lot 10, con. 3.

J. R. McNeillie, enclosing \$4.75 N. R. cash and percentages and giving statement of \$128.40 still due township from same.

Chas. Vassar, enclosing \$15.00 for pool license in P.V.K.

D. D. Campbell, notice of his intention to erect 150 rods wire fence on E side lot 19, con. 5.

Hopkins, Weeks & Hopkins, stating that they propose going on with the suit of D. D. Campbell on June 21st.

Mrs. E. J. McIntyre, forbidding the council to cut down trees and shrubbery opp. lot 5, con. 3.

Crushed Stone Ltd., offering to deliver stone at Lorneville at \$1.10 per ton.

Dpt. Colonization roads, stating that Government had granted \$1500 to aid in road construction in Eldon in 1912.

A. Fisher's affidavit that he had a sheep valued at \$12 killed by dogs.

Hector McLean, giving notice of his intention to erect 100 rods wire fence on 5th concession.

D. C. McFadyen, drawing the attention of council to inconvenience he is put to by the C.P.R. diverted road at lots 10 and 11 and notifying them that he will hold council liable for damages if they close the original road.

Wm. Mitchell waited on council, asking to have fences removed from across road allowance on 7th con., opp. lot 37 N.P.R. Hector McInnes stated he had built the fences and would remove them.

Wm. Jones waited on council asking for a special grant to fix road on quarter line between lots 15 and 16, con. 5.

McRae—A. D. McEachern—That by-law No. 391 be amended to read the Mansie Grove Telephone Association, instead of Eldon Central Telephone Co., and that the corporate seal be attached to this motion to give it force of a by-law.—Carried.

Moran—McRae—That Hector Holmes be instructed to remove the fences off 7th concession North Portage Road forthwith.—Carried.

McRae—A. D. McEachern—Write the clerk be instructed to write to Clerk McNeillie of Lindsay refusing to pay account of Duncan McDonald to the Oshawa Hospital, maintaining that Mimico Asylum be responsible for this account.—Carried.

McRae—Moran—That the revee and clerk make full arrangements for to defend the case of D. D. Campbell vs. Eldon.—Carried.

McRae—Moran—That by-law No. 380 of the township of Eldon, a by-law to expend \$3000 on public roads, be signed and sealed.—Carried.

Moran—W. F. McEachern—That this council instruct the revee and clerk to issue a writ against C.P.R. for unstated damages caused to public roads by them in building their C.P.R. track especially at lots 14, 13, 12, 11, 10, 8, 7, 6, 3 & 2 concession 8, and at lots 16, con. 4. 5.—Carried.

By-law No. 398 of the township of Eldon, a by-law making provisions for draining the public highway on 3rd concession line between lots 12 and 13 S.P.R. was introduced and read a first time on motion of McRae, seconded by Moran and finally passed on motion of W. F. McEachern, seconded by A. D. McEachern.

Accounts to the amount of \$238.09 were passed on motion of Moran, seconded by McRae.

Moran—McRae—That treasurer be authorized to pay D. W. McIntyre, ex-pathmaster, an advance of \$75 on work performed on sidewalks in Lorneville in the summer of 1911.—Carried.

A. D. McEachern—McRae—That the clerk be authorized to notify Col. Hughes about the dangerous condition of some of the Government roads of township of Eldon.—Carried.

Moran—McRae—That council meet at bridge on the 9th concession lot 16 on Monday, June 10th at 3 o'clock p. m.—Carried.
