This is one of the most trying seasons Ontario farmers have had to face in a long while. In the accompanying article Vim, writing from long experience, tells of past seasons which, in the end, turned out well.

Since the 11th of May it has rained at frequent intervals so that nothing could be done on the land. The rivers and creeks have brought down their floods and all the low lands are under water.

Yet to this dark cloud there is a silver lining. Fall wheat, meadows, and pastures are glorious in their luxuriance; this in direct contrast to last season's prospects.
