CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

COBOURG, June 25.—Hugh Patterson, a boy who gives his age as sixteen years, was arraigned before Police Magistrate F. D. Boggs here yesterday, on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of Harold George Webb, aged 12 years. Patterson was remanded until the 18th inst., no evidence being taken. Mr. A. J. Armstrong appeared as counsel for the accused, and Mr. W. F. Kerr, crown attorney, for the prosecution.

The shooting occurred at the home of Charles Gillespie, at Fenella, 20 miles from here, where Patterson had been employed for the past three months.

At the inquest held Monday night the jury found that Webb came to his death "by a gun shot wound inflicted by a gun in the hands of one Hugh Patterson, at about three o'clock p.m., on June 22nd, at the home of one Charles Gillespie. We further find that the said Hugh Patterson pointed the gun at the said Harold Webb without intent to kill."

The evidence showed that Patterson and Webb were on friendly terms.

The accused was brought to the County Jail here Monday night by Chief Ruse of Cobourg.
