COBOURG, June 25.-Hugh Patterson, a boy who gives his age as sixteen years, was arraigned before Police Magistrata F. D. At the inquest held Monday night the jury found that Webb came to his death "by a gun shot wound inflicted by a gun in the hands of one Hugh Patterson, at about three o'clock p.m., on June 22nd, at the home of one Charles Gillespie. We further find that the said Hugh Patterson pointed the gun at the said Harold Webb without intent to kill."
