CIVIC IMPROVEMENT---HOUSING PROBLEM PLANNING FOR A GREATER LINDSAY

Meeting of Citizens Held Last Evening

(From Wednesday's Post)
The beautification and the housing problem were two very important questions discussed at a splendid meeting of the citizens held in the chamber last evening. A number of young ladies, who were pleased to state are anxious to do their share towards improving conditions in the town.

CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS.
Reeve Kylie occupied the chair and in his opening remarks referred to the two important questions before the meeting.
The house problem was an important one. Mr. Fisher, of the Library and Office Fittings Co. had informed him that some of his employees had their furniture packed in the factory, being unable to secure houses. There was not much encouragement for the council to grant bonuses to new industries when there were no houses for the new comers.
In connection with the question of civic beautification Mr. Kylie briefly outlined a few excellent ideas and suggestions.
In connection with the housing problem, Messrs G. H. M. Baker and Geo. H. Wilson moved that the question be referred to a committee consisting of His Worship Mayor Beal, Reeve Kylie, Messrs. John Carew, G. H. M. Baker and G. H. Hopkins, K. C., who will investigate and report to council.
Mr. G. H. Hopkins, K. C., would like some one more conversant with the matter on the committee other than himself. The housing question is too previous, he felt, and until he could see the likelihood of more industries coming to Lindsay and a corresponding increase in population, he did not favor the proposition.
Mr. Carew--If the town can show reason why, and convince the government that they will be prepared to provide housing accommodation, the government would, he believed, introduce legislation giving municipalities power to guarantee bonds for this purpose.
Mr. Hopkins was not opposed to the proposition, but was not sufficiently conversant with the matter.
Mr. J. Carew said several gentlemen met the managing director of the Boving Co., Mr. Douglas Spencer, that afternoon, and he wanted to know what Lindsay was going to do in connection with housing the large number of men the industry would employ. In view of the new industries coming, many new houses

would have to be erected.
Mr. G. H. M. Baker--The appointment of the committee is the only solution.
Dep-Reeve Dobson suggested that Mr. Baker be added to the committee.
Dr. Vrooman was certain of one thing. The Legislature was going to be very careful in future guaranteeing municipal bonds. There was too much of it in the province.
Mr. J. D. Flavell said there was scarcely a house of the proper kind in Lindsay and something would have to be done to solve the problem. The heads of the new industries were most anxious that the situation be promptly met.
The resolution was adopted.
CIVIC IMPROVEMENT
The next matter coming up for consideration was the report of the Citizens' Committee in connection with the Civic Improvement Association.
Mr. J. G. Edwards, President, said the Citizens' Committee appointed the Civic Improvement Association, had met a couple of times and went into the matter of civic improvement very carefully and in all its details. We want a clean town and clean people, and if the work proposed is carried out, the social and moral condition of the citizens as well as general appearance of the town will be greatly improved.
Mr. Edwards outlined briefly the duties required of several committees, after which Mr. W. W. Staples, secretary, read the following report--

Lindsay, June 24, 1913
To the Mayor and Citizens of the Town of Lindsay--
Ladies and Gentlemen--We, your committee, appointed by you at the citizens' meeting a week or so ago, for the purpose of drafting a constitution and nominating officers for the Lindsay Civic Improvement Association beg leave to present the following report--
Your committee met in the board room of the Public Library on Monday evening, June 16th. There were present Messrs. J. G. Edwards, John Carew, G. H. M. Baker, B. J. Gough, A. B. McIntyre and W. W. Staples. Mr. J. G. Edwards took the chair, and on motion of Messrs. Baker and Carew, Mr. W. W. Staples was appointed secretary of the committee.
Mr. Edwards presented for inspection many pamphlets on several phases of Civic Improvement, which he had received from the American Civic Association. These the committee examined carefully. It was moved by Mr. Baker, seconded by Mr. Gough, that the constitution as outlined by Miss Zonna Gale of the American Civic Association be the constitution adopted by this Association.--CARRIED.

CONSTITUTION
Article I--Name--The name of this organization shall be "The Lindsay Civic Improvement Association."
Article II--Object--The object of this Association shall be the improvement of the town of Lindsay in sanitation, education, beauty and other conditions, which shall conduce to the health, morality, happiness, and general good citizenship of its people.
Article III--Members--Any person may become a member of this Association by signing the constitution, and paying the following small membership fee annually to the treasurer, gentlemen 50c., ladies 25c., children 10c.
Article IV, Sec 1--Officers of this Association shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and an Executive Committee.
Section 2--The officers may be named by a nominating committee, and shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting.
Section 3--The Executive Board shall consist of the officers, seven members of the Association elected by ballot, and the chairman of the standing committees.
Article V--Section 1--The Association shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in April, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Association or called by the Executive Board.
Section 2--One-fourth of the enrollment shall constitute a quorum, provided that at any time fifteen shall constitute a quorum.
Article VI--The standing committees of the Association shall be as follows--Sanitation, Education, Outdoor Art, Children's Auxiliary, Streets and Alleys, Public Buildings and Recreation, Rest Room, Tree Culture, Charity Co-ordination, Membership and Press.
Article VII--Amendments.
The following are the officers and committees suggested for the Civic Improvement Association by the nominating Committee--
Honorary Presidents--Col. the Hon.

It was moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Baker, that this committee recommend that a fountain be placed at once at the intersection of Kent and William streets, and that this committee shall become responsible for the same if the Association does not.--Carried.
Moved by Mr. McIntyre, seconded by Mr. Gough, that Messrs. Carew and Staples be a committee to interview the proper authorities regarding permission to erect the fountain.--Carried.
Moved by Mr. Baker, seconded by Mr. Carew, that the Mayor be instructed to call a public meeting on Tuesday evening, June 24th, to receive the report of this committee, and perfect the organization of the Lindsay Civic Improvement Association.--Carried.
The meeting then adjourned.

Mr. G. H. M. Baker said the idea of a Civic Improvement Association is a good one. There was any amount of work to do, and the aims and objects are good. The principles were first unity, Lindsay first, last and always.
"The objects, principals and aims of this Association will be as follows: The objects are to improve the health of every citizen from the children up, to beautify the streets by cleaning them and improving the residential lots and the vacant lots, to supply parks, citizens' clubs, and amusements, lectures, etc., that will be educational, beneficial, pleasing, and interesting for the citizens.
The principles of this Association are first, unity, that all the people shall partake in the efforts of this Association, and all the improvements shall be paid for by the people for the people.
We all will have an opportunity to share in each and every fountain, park, clubhouse and other improvement that this Association may be able to establish. The individual principle of every citizen toward this Association will be to become a member by paying the small membership fee that is being asked by the Association, and as much more as they are able to give, and to help every committee that has anything to do towards beautifying our town and any work that the Association may have to look after.
The aim of the Association is to make Lindsay a clean, bright, healthy and happy town, and with the united effort of each and every citizen we should accomplish our aim, and make Lindsay the cleanest, brightest, healthiest and happiest town to live in, that you may find anywhere under the British flag.
Mr. John Carew said he was glad to see the good attendance, especially the ladies. In connection with the proposed fountain, the suggestion came up at the committee meeting, and the members were unanimous. The fountain is not one for drinking purposes, but was for ornamental purposes. There was room, he felt, for the fountain at that point, and that seemed to be the consensus of opinion, owing to the wide area at the street intersections. It would be paid for by the Civic Improvement Association. The foundation would have at its base ferns and other bloom, and from its centre would rise a pedestal topped with an electric light. It was for the people to decide where the fountain was to be located. The town will have a couple of parks in the future to improve and there will be work to do for all. All that is wanted is a long pull, a strong pull, and a pull all together. The paving contractors are only too glad to do anything to help beautify the street.
Dr. White moved the adoption of the report and expressed his gratification that the organization was under way. He had felt for some time that we were a little behind in civic beautification. The doctor emphasized the great power for good result from such a scheme. Civic cleanliness would have a tendency towards the moral uplift of the community.
Mr. G. Blackwell, in seconding the report, paid a tribute to the committee on the splendid report presented. Great achievements have developed out of small beginnings, and as proof of this he instanced the growth of the fruit industry in British Columbia. The first fruit tree had been planted in 1859. Ten years later 10,000 acres were orchards, and at the present time 100,000 acres are under orchard.
Mr. G. H. Hopkins, K. C., said the committee deserved every credit for the amount of work performed. He hoped, however, that the amount of work outlined would not overtax the machinery of the organization. He was glad to see Lindsay getting out of the mud. In his travels he did

Moved by W. Best seconded by G. Maloney that Councillors Walden and Brock and Reeve Robertson be a committee with power to purchase a gravel pit in Division No. 4 and also to view and approve of assuming the diverted road at Pogue's Corner on C. P. R. and see Wm. I. Reid re fence.--Carried.
Moved by W. Best seconded by J. Brock that an advance of \$200 to S. S. No. 6 Ops and \$100 to Union S. S. No. 16 Emily and Ops be authorized.--Carried.
Moved by W. Walden seconded by G. Maloney that R. Wellington's complaint to re ditch be referred to Com. Best to be arranged with the interested parties.--Carried.
Moved by W. Best seconded by J. Brock that the following accounts be paid.
