Drowning Fatality Narrowly Averted
Little Jack Nofall had a Close call at Peterboro

The Otonabee river came near to claiming another victim last Friday afternoon, when Carl Nofall, the nine year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Nofall, corner of Aymer and Murray-sts had a very narrow escape from drowning while in bathing in the river at the foot of Dublin street. A large number of boys were, as usual, swimming there and the little fellow went in with the rest. He was splashing around in the shallow water near shore when he suddenly found himself out of his depth. His predicament was not noticed by the other boys in the water and he was going down for the third time when Newton Thompson, son of sanitary inspector Thompson, who was on the pier nearby saw that he was drowning. Throwing off his coat the plucky youngster, plunged from the pier and seizing the drowning boy by the hair as he was disappearing for the third time, he succeeded in making shore with Nofall and the latter soon revived.

Only the prompt action of his rescuer saved his life as the boys who were swimming with him did not notice his danger or else were not eager to come to the rescue.

Man Crushed at Midland

Frank King Meets with Terrible Accident while at Work Saturday

A horrible accident occurred in the Grand Trunk yards at Midland on Saturday in which a brakeman named Frank King, of Lindsay-st., town was the victim.

The unfortunate man was engaged in shunting cars and while hanging on to one of the box cars happened to get his legs under the wheels. King however, gamely held on and after the first trucks had passed over he raised himself enough to get his limbs out of reach of the hind wheels.

There were a number of people who witnessed the accident and as soon as possible the train was stopped. The young fellow was carried to the nearest house where a doctor attended to his injuries. He was afterwards removed to the hospital.

The doctors think that although they are badly mutilated they will be able to save his legs. In all probability Mr. King will be brought home to-morrow.

Bordeaux Mixture

When leaves turn yellow or get rust-spotted, or when they wrinkle up and drop, and you cannot find any insect at work, give the plant a spraying with the mixture. Be sure to wash all vegetables carefully before using them for the table if they have been sprayed, as the stuff is poisonous.
