Will Inspect Health Conditions

Of Stoney Lake—Dr. Bell, Provincial Inspector, is in Town

Dr. R. W. Bell, of Toronto, medical inspector for the provincial board of health, is on his way to Stoney Lake on a tour of inspection. He will spend a day there and hopes to ascertain what was the cause of the typhoid outbreak there last summer.

Dr. Bell states that the health of the province is exceedingly good at the present time. Smallpox has practically been stamped out, there being only two or three cases now. One of these is at Niagara Falls, Ont. Dr. Bell was there one day last week. He was at Gananoque on Tuesday and at Warkworth on Wednesday.

Health Hints.

Itinerary of Post Free Trip

How Eight Pleasant Days Will be Spent—About the St. Lawrence.

Just by way of explanation the itinerary of the Post's Toronto to Quebec Free Trip is published to-day. It will be seen that eight days of real sight seeing are provided for, including at least four days on the water at a time of year when everything in nature is at its best.

The party leaves Lindsay on Aug. 27, taking the boat at Toronto, arriving at Charlotte (the port of Rochester) at 9:15 that night. Kingston will be called on at five o'clock a. m., and Prescott will have been reached by about ten o'clock next morning. Montreal is reached at 6:30 p. m. The trip is resumed at 7 o'clock and Quebec is reached early on the morning of Aug. 29th.

The return trip is commenced at 8 p. m. that night, arriving at Montreal at 7 o'clock Sunday, Aug. 30. A stop of a day and a half is made in Montreal coming back, the party taking the noon boat for Prescott, arriving there at 7 o'clock next morning, the 1st of September. After a four hours' stay the trips through the Thousand Islands in daylight begins. The American side of the river will be followed, making a call at Ogdensburg, N. Y., one of the features. Charlotte will be reached at half-past ten on the night of September first. Rochester will be visited during that evening and the next day, the boat being boarded for Toronto at 11:45 p.m. on the evening of Sept. 3rd. Toronto will be reached early next morning, and the day spent in seeing the Queen City and the Canadian National Exhibition.
