EMILY COUNCIL

Council met at Omomee at ten o'clock a.m. on July 7, all members being present.

The following communications were received, perused, and filed: From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, advising county rates required for the current year, as follows: General Purpose Rate \$2749.25 House of Refuge Debt Rate 312.48 House of Refuge Gen'l Rate 569.85 School Rate (exclusive of the portion of the Township annexed to the Village of Omomee for school purposes)..... 191.90

Total \$3823.48 From J. H. McLellan, Supt. of the Trent Canal, Peterboro, in re the construction of the proposed roadway across the Emily Creek Marsh, and advising that as soon as the water fell to its normal condition and the country was thoroughly dry the matter would be gone into.

From Bert Laidley, making application for the use of the road-grader for the purpose of grading the lane on his farm.

From the Clerk of the Township of Ops enclosing an order in favor of the Township Treasurer for \$9.65 to balance boundary account for the year 1907.

From the Ontario Municipal Association, advising annual meeting at Toronto on 2nd and 3rd September next, soliciting membership fee and requesting appointment of representatives to the Secretary, K. W. McKeay, St. Thomas, Ont.

From the manager of the Bank of Toronto, Omomee, in compliance with Sec. 20, Chap. 48, of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, advising amount at credit of the Municipality in said bank on the 30th day of June last to be \$809.47.

From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, in compliance with the Assessment Act, Section 81, Sub-Section 2, enclosing copy of the County Equalization By-law No. 651. For the purpose of levying county rates in and for the year 1909.

An application was received from the trustees of Section No. 5, for one hundred dollars to apply on account of teacher's salary.

Mr. James Carroll attended in re. the closing up of the ditch opposite the premises of Joseph R. Lucas on the West Quarter Line.

The reeve reported that temporary repairs should be made to Cowan's bridge as soon as possible.

The clerk was instructed to advise Mr. Bert Laidley that he could have the use of the road-grader at the usual rate of two dollars per day.

After discussing the matter of the closing up of the ditch opposite the premises of Joseph R. Lucas, it was decided that the matter was too expensive for the ordinary expenditure of one commissioner, and that a special grant should be made to furnish culvert pipe for said ditch and to cover the cost of the placing of said pipe properly therein for drainage purposes.

Councillor Courtney reported that he had arranged to lease a gravel pit from Margaret and Mary Lucas for a term of fifty years, the consideration being fifty dollars.

Moved by Councillor William Herlihey, seconded by Councillor Robt. Wilson, that the reeve and treasurer be authorized to borrow from the Bank of Toronto, or other monetary institution, such sums of money, from time to time as may be required to meet the current expenditure of this municipality, at the rate of six per cent. per annum, the whole outstanding amount, however, at any time, not to exceed the sum of two thousand dollars, and that the clerk do now prepare the necessary by-law for this purpose. Carried.

Moved by Councillor Jas. Courtney, seconded by Councillor Robt. W. Wilson, that an order be passed in favor of Margaret and Mary Lucas for fifty dollars, being the consideration in re. gravel pit lease, the said order to be handed to the said Margaret and Mary Lucas on execution of lease and that the clerk be and is hereby instructed to draft said lease for execution as soon as possible. Carried.

Moved by Councillor Jas. Courtney, seconded by Councillor William Cottingham, that by-law No. 356 for the purpose of authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow money from time to time to meet the current expenditure of the municipality be now introduced and read a first time. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Wm. Herlihey, sec. by Coun. R. W. Wilson, that by-law number 357 for the purpose of appointing Wm. Cottingham and Jas. Courtney, respectively, special commissioners to assess and carry out the respective repairs to Cowan's Bridge and the filling in of the ditch on the West Quarter Line opposite the premises of Jos. R. Lucas, be now introduced and read a first time. Carried.

Moved by Coun. R. W. Wilson, sec. by Coun. Wm. Herlihey, that by-law number 358 be now read a second and a third time and finally passed, and that the reeve and clerk do sign and affix the corporate seal thereto. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Wm. Herlihey, sec. by Coun. R. W. Wilson, that this council do now adjourn to meet on Tuesday, the fourth day of August next, at the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon. Carried.

OPS COUNCIL

The members of the Ops council met on Saturday, July 18th, in the afternoon, and formed themselves into a Court of Revision, with Wm. H. Wilson in the chair.

There were only two appeals against assessment, namely, Israel Goodhand

owner of part of lot 1, con. 1-37 acres. His land was assessed \$2,100 but he contended that he had no road and was obliged to spend a lot of money in winter shovelling snow.

After duly considering the matter the court reduced his assessment \$100.

Mr. James Long, owner of lot 24, and North half of lot 23, in the 3rd concession, was assessed \$7,500 which he considered too high in comparison with his neighbor's assessment.

After comparing the assessment of his vicinity, with Mr. Long's assessment was, on motion, confirmed.

The Grove cheese factory being now in operation was assessed \$100. Fifty-six names, mostly of the Mahood franchise class, were next added to the roll.

Several transfers in assessment of property recently sold were then made by the court, after which it closed, on motion of Messrs. Hawkins and Coulter.

ORDINARY TOWNSHIP BUSINESS
 The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. O'Loughlin, that the assessment roll as now revised be confirmed, and that the assessor be paid the balance of his salary, \$22.00—Carried.

Mr. Jas. Peel, lawyer, said that he and his neighbors were building 450 feet of three foot cement walk near his place, and as they were tax payers of Ops and no other being made from the council he thought the council should aid them to the extent of \$50.

Moved by Mr. Hawkins, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, that the matter be left in the hands on Commissioner O'Loughlin. Carried.

John Doughlin, John Copeland, and Foster Thompson of Mariposa, addressed the council on the bad condition of the 4th quarter line across the 1st concession and said several rigs had been broken there already and that it was impossible to draw a load over it. Being on the direct road from Mariposa to Lindsay, it should be put in better condition as serious accidents to horses or vehicles were likely to occur at any time on it.

Commissioner O'Loughlin said all his appropriation had been expended and unless the council made an additional grant he could do nothing.

After duly considering the matter it was decided to expend \$25 at present to fill the ruts with small stone and fill the most dangerous places and make additional expenditure on it next year.

Mr. Geo. Smith, township engineer was present and laid before the council a map or plan of the Stoney Creek drainage system which embraces a large portion of South-east Ops.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Hawkins, that the following accounts now passed be paid: Miss M. R. Baker, typewriting and drain, \$5.00; Geo. Mahajay, serving papers, H. drain, \$2.00; John Lynch balance on bridge and tile, \$5.99; Wm. H. Wilson, refund Robt. McGinnis for gravel, \$4.70; J. H. Wilson, for 88 loads gravel, \$9.89; Ralph Edgerton, refund for gravel \$1.50; Jm. Houghton, for gravel, \$2.10; Hugh Patton, for gravel, \$4.50; John Brown, refund statue labor tax \$2.00.

Live Bits of News

Eight battleships are now at Quebec.
 —The Cornwall cotton mills have resumed.
 —The western harvest will be 20 days earlier.
 —Oil has been struck at Maple Creek, Sask.
 —The capacity of the Calgary lighting plant is to be tripled.
 —Montreal's population, according to the directory, is 450,000 a gain of 12 per cent.
 —John D. McGregor, farmer of Trafalgar, is the federal liberal candidate for Halton.
 —The staff of the Quebec post office will be increased by 70 men during the celebration.
 —Rev. J. K. Ainsworth, of Hamilton, has received a call to Westminster Congregational church.
 —Joseph Damman, of Melancton, is accused of trying to fire his son's barn and commit suicide.
 —The New Brunswick Government has renewed its London loan of about \$2,600,000 at 3 3/4 per cent.
 —Frank Hogan, from Parry Sound, serving a term in Kingston penitentiary, changed himself Friday.
 —Mrs. William Day, of Sydney, Ont., is under arrest, charged with attempting to shoot her husband.
 —Fort Douglas Pat, a well known B. C. Indian and trapper, was drowned with his squaw in Skookumchuck River.
 —The steamer Toronto had to drift to her wharf at Kingston, as the water was high and so broke all her fenders.
 —Harold Livingston, the three-year old son of H. Livingston, a farmer, of Lulu Island, B. C., was drowned in a dyke.
 —The customs revenue for the first three months of the fiscal year totalled \$10,838,298 a decrease of \$4,231,968.
 —Claude Macdonald, M. P., expects to leave Dansville, N. Y., shortly where he has been a patient at a sanitarium.
 —Charles Campbell, a Scott, four years in Canada, died in Hamilton of apoplexy after sending home for his wife and children.
 —Irwin and Leland Diamond, of Lancaster, O., Industrial school could not enter Canada at Niagara, as they had not \$25 each.
 —Thos. Kennedy's new residence at Oshawa was burned Friday, and his wife and two children were rescued by a ladder.
 —The accounts of the late Deputy Surveyor-General Flewelling, of New Brunswick, who was \$18,655 in arrears, are being audited.
 —After eleven years in the courts the case of Saunby v. City of London has ended by an award of \$2,140, and the costs total over \$70,000.

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
