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



ly tests in the Innerkip, Ont. cow. testing association showed that 160 cows gave an average yield of 833 lbs. mick, lesting 3.4 thus containing 34.6 lbs. fat. One excellent herd's average is from 10 cows each giving 1390 lbs. milk, 3.3 test. The highest yield in the herd was 1850 lbs. milk for the month. In all but one of the 12 herds recorded are single cows giving 1000

lbs. milk on more. Another district averaged only 664 lbs. milk per cow, while in a third district the average was 562 lbs. Some herds were as low as 412 lbs. milk, 13 1-2 lbs. fat as an average of 9 cows. This is less than one third of the yield of the herd noted above at Innerkip.
