The Filter Contract Is Approved

A meeting of the Water Commissioners was held on Friday in Secretary Ray's office. There were present Messrs. Flavell, Begg, Sinclair and Brady, Superintendent Hammond and Attorney Scinson.

The meeting was called to go over the contract between the town and Mr. Bridge, and make any changes that were thought necessary. Mr. Flavell thought that it was extremely important that the filter should be large enough to contain 1000 gallons. The present filter only holds 800 gallons and the pump pumps one thousand gallons a minute. Mr. Bridge says the filter down at the pump house is fairly alive with bacteria. He was looking at it yesterday and it was no wonder, tap water is bad. There are a lot of dead fish in it. Mr. Flavell said he thought we should have our water filtered even for a fire.

A telegram was sent to the filter company at Philadelphia, to see what the extra cost would be for a filter that would contain one and a half million gallons instead of a million gallons. The contract was then read and approved.

Wine Jelly

Soak one box of gelatin in one cupful of cold water for an hour, and then add to it three cupfuls of sugar, the juice of two lemons and the grated peel of one and a good pinch of cinnamon. Let all stand together in a cool place for an hour. Turn in a quart of boiling water, over them a quart of boiling water, until the gelatin is entirely dissolved; add a pint of good sherry, strain through a flannel -- do not squeeze it -- and turn into a mold with cold water. If the gelatin does not dissolve, put it over the fire for a moment until the liquid comes to a boil. Do this, of course, before the wine goes in. -- The August Delineator.
