Regular Meeting Cheese Board

The regular meeting of the Lindsay Cheese Board was held in the town clerk's office this morning in which cheese sold for 10 3-16c. and 10 1/2c. There was boarded 1344 cheese in all, Bobcaygeon having largest on hand, having in all 176 cheese. The full staff of regular buyers were also on hand, they being Gillespie, J. Brown, Wm. Flavell and Fitzgerald.

Mr. Fitzgerald, bidding 10 13-16c., chose the Star, Dunstond, and North Ops. Wm. Flavell selected at 10 1/2c. North Verulam, Reaboro, Bobcaygeon, and North Harvey. Mr. Gillespie at 10 1/2c. selected Mariposa, Maple Leaf and Red Rock.

MONSTER ORANGE DEMONSTRATION HELD IN LINDSAY ON TUESDAY

Rather threatening weather greeted the thousands of Orangemen who assembled in Lindsay today to celebrate the two hundred and twentieth anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne.

As was expected, the demonstration was the greatest ever held in this part of the province, and never in the history of the town did so many Sons of William assemble in Lindsay.

All roads led to Lindsay today, and at an early hour the people commenced to pour in from all points of the compass. The shrill notes of the fife and the rub-a-dub-dub of the drum resounded in the air on all sides, relieved occasionally by the blare of a brass band.

The streets, which were gaily decorated for the occasion, presented an animated scene. Young men and boys gaily bedecked in ribbons and the regalia of their respective lodges, and fair maidens in immaculate white dresses relieved by a dash of orange, mingled with hundreds of others on the thoroughfares and marched from the railway stations to the curling rink.

The immense crowd was a good natured and orderly one. The people had come to town to spend the day, to view the procession and enjoy themselves generally. Drunken men were as scarce as chicken's teeth and

eight thousand made an assemblage of great immensity.

When the visitors arrived in town they were at once made to feel perfectly at home and were greatly pleased with the reception which they were greeted with by the local brethren. The spirit of loyalty and enthusiasm which prevailed in the town and which was demonstrated by the abundance of excellent decora-

there was nothing to mar the day's celebration.

Many lodges made their first visit to Lindsay, which demonstrates that the fame of Lindsay's demonstration is spreading, and judging from the remarks made by the brethren of these lodges regarding the hospitalities extended them, the visit here was a pleasant one for them.

FOURTEEN THOUSAND PEOPLE

Early in the morning regular and special trains brought people from all over the district for miles and miles away. Lodges were in attendance from the extreme north country, and also from away beyond Cobourg and Havelock on the east. They arrived from the counties of Simcoe, Haliburton, Northumberland, Peterboro, North Ontario, Durham, and Victoria and from outlying districts. The dimensions of the crowd in town fully reached the expectations of the Lindsay Orangemen, that is, there were fully fourteen thousand people in town, and on a rough estimate we hear, on good authority, that some 7,000 people arrived on the Grand Trunk line all told, and nearly 3000 on the C.P.R. besides those who came in by boat and those who walked or drove into town. From Peterboro a special train contained some 700 people, while there was also a special from Port Hope, besides a number of trains coming in in two sections. This great multitude, when mingled with Lindsay's population of

tions in the line of flags and long streamers, at once grew contagious on the incoming visitors and those who weren't already bedecked with ribbons at once proceeded to secure a string of flourishing ribbons and badges. All trains were met by the Lindsay brethren and Citizens' Band who showed the visiting lodges to the curling rink, where drums, banners and other emblems were stacked till the afternoon. But the tunes were kept on the full tare all day, even during noon hour, when the large curling rink fairly trembled with the continual shrill of the fife followed by the heavy beat of the drum.

ENTERTAINED AT LUNCHEON

The Reception Committee, of which Bro. R. R. Elliot was chairman, met the different speakers from a distance at the train and conveyed them up town in hacks. At 12.30 o'clock they were entertained at luncheon at the Benson house together with a few prominent local brethren, at which Mr. Elliot presided.

THE PROCESSION

At two o'clock the various lodges all assembled at Victoria Park. Owing to the immensity of the gathering and the large number of spectators who found their way into the park, and obstructed the facilities for mustering the parade, a large portion of the parade had to be drawn out of the park for the pur-

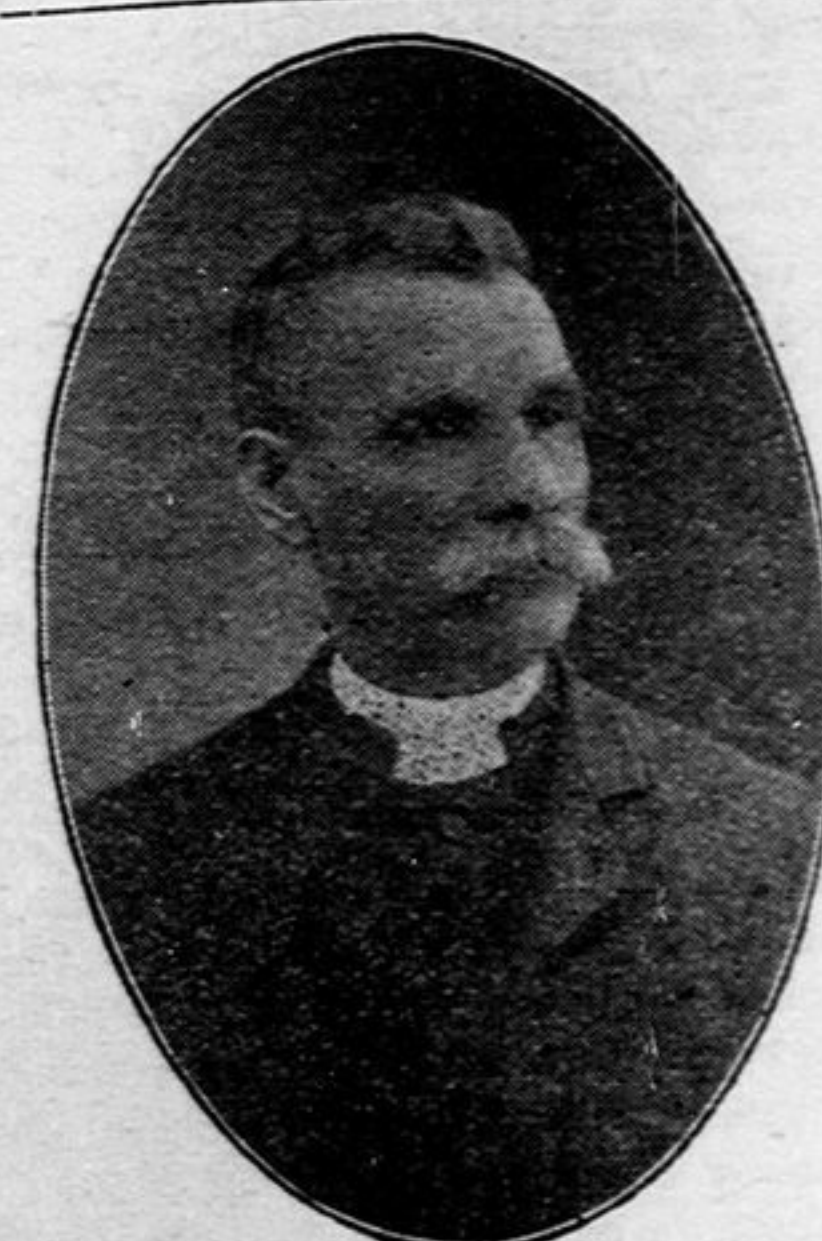
