CATTLE MARKETS

Little Doing in American Cattle Markets—Hogs Slightly Lower. Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, July 12.—Receipts of live stock were reported by the railways to be 72 carloads, consisting of 956 cattle, 479 hogs, 804 sheep and lambs, with 284 calves and 1 horse.

Stocks and feeders. Henry Murby reports nothing doing, few being offered, and few wanted, at present stage of the game. The rest of the market is quiet. The following prices: Steers, 80 to 1000 lbs. each, \$4.75 to \$5.25; steers, 700 to 800 lbs. each, \$4.25 to \$4.75; stockers, \$2.75 to \$4.25.

Milkers and springers were in excess of the demand, and prices took a tumble. Fred Armstrong, who bought 20 cows, reported prices easier at \$5 to \$5.50 each.

Eight hundred sheep and lambs were sold as follows: Sheep, ewes, light, \$4 to \$4.50; ewes, heavy, \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; rams, \$3 to \$3.50.

Prices steady, at \$3.25 for select, fed and watered at the market, and \$3.75 f.o.b. cars at country points, to drovers; and this would mean \$5.60 to the farmer.

BY-LAW NO.

A BY-LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE BORROWING OF \$10,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF STEEL AND CONCRETE BRIDGES.

WHEREAS it is, in the opinion of the County Council, desirable to construct certain steel and concrete bridges for the County of Victoria.

AND WHEREAS for that purpose the sum of \$10,000.00 is required to be raised, over and above the ordinary current expenditure of the County.

AND WHEREAS, to raise the said sum of \$10,000.00 it will be necessary to issue debentures of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, for the sum of \$10,000.00, which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law, the proceeds of said debentures to be applied for the said purposes.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time, and to make the principal of said debt repayable by yearly sums during a period of twenty years, being the currency of the said debentures, the said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt, shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount payable in each of the other nineteen years of said period, as shown in schedule "A" hereto annexed.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate, for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided, is \$735.82.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, according to the last Revised and equalized assessment rolls thereof, is \$15,981,578.90.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Municipality is \$60,000.00, whereof no portion of the principal or interest is in arrears and the sinking fund thereof now amounts to the sum of \$8,739.96.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE COUNTY OF VICTORIA ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

- 1. That for the purpose of raising the sum of \$10,000.00 to be expended for the purpose of the construction of steel and concrete bridges for the County of Victoria, debentures of the Corporation of the County of Victoria shall be issued on the Twentieth day of December, A. D., 1910, in the amount of \$10,000.00, with interest yearly at the rate of Four per cent per annum, that is to say, the principal and interest in twenty equal annual instalments of \$735.82 each, the said sum of \$10,000.00 with the annual instalment required to pay the said sum of \$10,000.00 with interest at Four per cent per annum in twenty years, as shown by the said annexed schedule; the said debentures shall be payable one each on the Twentieth Day of December in each of the years 1911 to 1930 inclusive, at the office of the Treasurer of the County of Victoria, at the Court House in the Town of Lindsay.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Warden of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, and he is hereby empowered, authorized and instructed to sign the same, and to issue the debentures hereby authorized to be issued and to cause the same to be signed by the treasurer of the said Municipality. And the clerk of the said Municipality is hereby authorized and instructed to attach the seal of the Corporation to said Debentures.

3. That during the currency of the said debentures there shall be made annually by special rate on all the rateable property of the said Corporation of the said County of Victoria, the sum of \$735.82 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years, for principal and interest, in respect of the said debt, as shown in the said Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

4. This by-law shall come into force and take effect on the day of the passing thereof.

PASSED at Lindsay this 15th Day of November, A. D. 1910.
