Great Gee-Gees' Game Fights For Glory.

The phrase "Won by a short head!" which you often see in the racing news, means that the horse that won pulled off the race by a foot, or perhaps a little less, and sometimes that the judge may, and sometimes does, have considerable difficulty in deciding which of the two leading horses was actually the winner.

Indeed, there have been cases in which the onlookers have quarrelled seriously with the judge's decision. For instance, in the English Derby of 1869, Pretender and Gomez came in so nearly abreast that most who saw the finish declared the result a dead-heat.

The Blue Riband of the English turf has often been won by the shortest of short heads. In 1880 the race lay between Robert the Devil—ridden by Rossiter—and Bend d'Or, with Fred Archer in the saddle.

In 1881 Archer won on the famous American horse Iroquois, and two years later came one of the finest struggles ever seen, when three great horses—Highland Chief, Galliard, and St. Blaise—all galloped in together.
