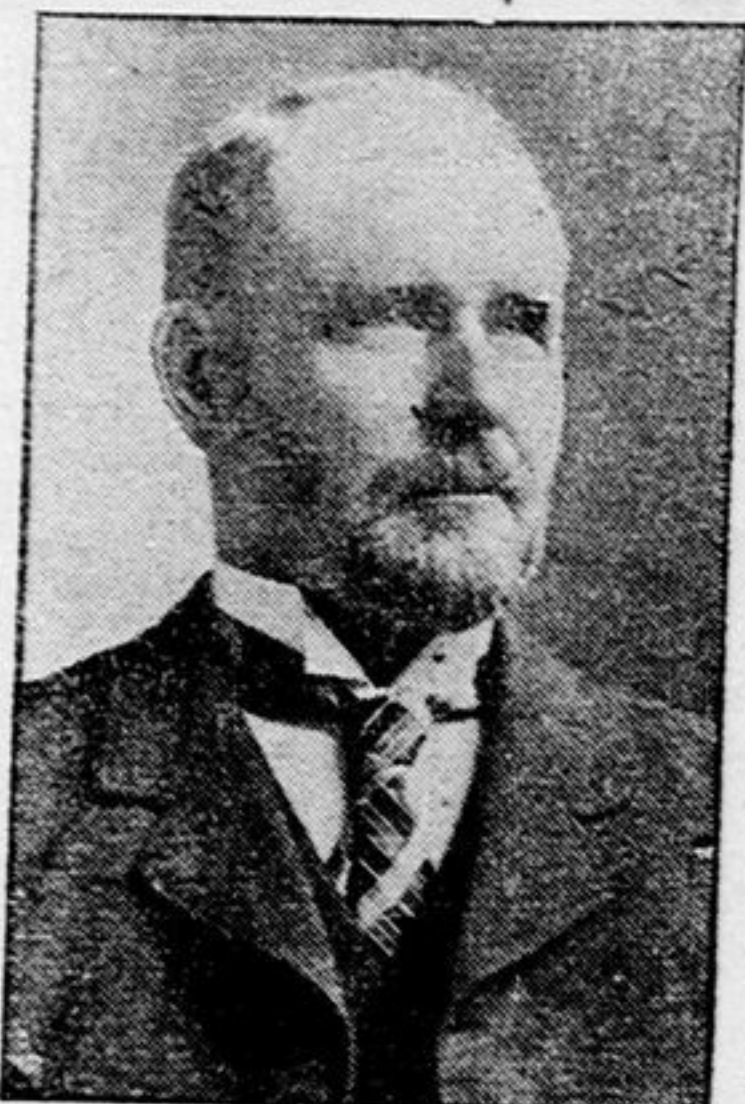

FUNERAL OF LATE SAMUEL J. FOX CITIZENS PAID LAST TRIBUTE OF RESPECT

The last tribute of respect was paid today by the citizens of Lindsay and the surrounding district to the late S. J. Fox, M.P.P., whose remains were laid at rest in the Riverside cemetery.

The remains lay in state in St. Paul's church from 10 a.m., until the funeral service at 2.30 p.m., and were viewed by a large number of citizens.



Notwithstanding the excessive heat St. Paul's church was filled by a large concourse of friends of the deceased, at the impressive funeral services conducted by Rev. Canon Marsh, assisted by Rev. ONTARIO'S CLAIM TO CANAL POWERS PEOPLE WILL GET PLENTY OF IT

Lttawa, July 5.—The announcement that the Ontario Government claimed the right to have power developed from Dominion canals and proposed to press for compensation to the extent of \$100,000 a year, was brought to the attention of Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals to-day. Mr. Graham said: "I recently received a letter from Hon. Mr. Cochrane, intimating that the Ontario Government contemplate taking this stand, but I hardly thought the matter would be given out for publication before I had time to make a reply. It will be remembered that an act was put through by the Ontario Government last session, looking to this contention. The courts have held that where a lease was given by the Provincial Governments of land bordering on the shore it carried with it the bed of the stream. The act recently passed by the Legislature in short, declared that the Government in granting those leases, never intended that they should include the beds of streams and consequently that where the Dominion Government has acquired rights from these riparian owners these did not carry with them any rights at all to the power. The Ontario Government, while admitting the possibility of Federal authority to take water from lakes and streams for navigation purposes, insist that any power incidentally developed by the construction of dams shall remain Provincial jurisdiction. That, therefore, while the Dominion may construct the works necessary for navigation purposes, it is not entitled to any revenue from any water power that may have been temporarily developed. "From speeches delivered by Hon. Mr. Beck, it may be inferred that the situation along the Trent Valley, where municipalities are being supplied with cheap power, is aimed at, and what Hon. Mr. Cochrane seems to contend for is that while the Dominion may spend the money necessary to construct the dams, the province is entitled to all the revenue. "What ever may be the result of the difference of opinion between the Governments, it is hardly likely anything will occur to prevent the people from getting the cheap power which is within their reach through the works the Dominion Government is carrying on."
