JOHN BEGLEY

Death on Saturcay removed another prominent resident of Lindsay, in the person of the late John Begley, who passed away at the family residence, corner of Lindsay and York-sts. in his seventy-fourth year.

The late John Begley was born near Cornwall, Ontario, afterwards removing with his parents to Cannifton, Hastings Co.. The deceased during his career also resided in Belleville. Bowmanville and Napanee, coming from the latter town in 1373 to Lindsay, where he embarked with his brother, Mr. Robert Begley, of Peterboro in the furniture business. Their factory was situated on Lindsay-st. north, almost immediately in front of the Madison Williams foundry, while the wareroom was situated in the East Ward near the G. T. R. and C. P. R. diamond,

The deceased was at that time one of the town's most active citizens, always manifesting the despest interests in its welfare. He sarved the town in the council board for two years.

For some years past the late Mr. Begley has been in declining health, and during the past year or two has suffered considerably from his ments. The exemplary life which he led, however, stood him in good stead, and his sufferings, which were most severe during the last two months, were borne with Christain for titude. The deceased was a devout member of St. Mary's Church.

During the Fenian raid of 1866, the late Mr. Begley, who was a Sergeant in the Kingston Garrison Artillery, was attached to the gunboat, Reecue which was in commission in guarding the frontier towns from an attack by the invaders.

In October, 1869 the deceased was united in marriage at Port Hope, by Vicar General Browne to Bridget GIRL PROSTRATED Captain Arthur Thirkell, of Chicago Byrne, daughter of the late Patrick Byrne, of Ops

The deceased is also survived by a sister, Miss Mary Begley, of Boston, and a brother, Mr Robert Begley, or Peterboro.

The funeral took place this morning from the family residence at 9.30 o' clock to St. Mary's Church, where requiem was chanted by Rev. Archdeacon Casey. H. M. HOLTORF

The death took place Thursday of one of the town's pioneer business men in the person of Henry Max Holtori. Mr. Holtorf was born in Sshlewig Holstein, Germany. 
