MONTREAL, July 11.—There continues to be a steady demand from foreign buyers for Manitoba spring wheat, and as the prices bid for the lower grades and samples wheat are in line a fair amount of business is passing, but the prices bid for the higher grades are still cut of line with values here. A fair export trade is also doing in oats, there being a good demand from European sources. There was also an increased demand for spring wheat flour for export accounts and sales of several thousand sacks were made at an advance in prices. The local trade is fair.

TORONTO, July 11.—The railways reported 69 carloads of live stock at the City Market, consisting of 877 cattle, 1221 hogs, 749 sheep and lambs and 92 calves.

The quality of cattle was medium to good as a rule, with a considerable percentage of grassers.

Trade was slow, with prices steady as Monday's decline, with the exception of one or two loads of butcher cattle that were reported at \$5.55 per cwt., which was about 10c better than on Monday.

Prices for sheep, lambs and calves were unchanged.

Mr. Harris quoted select, fed and watered at the market, at \$7.20, and \$6.50 f.o.b. cars at country points.

DECORATIONS FROM FRENCH GOVERNMENT

Montreal, July 12.—On the occasion of the annual fete of the Union Nationale Francaise, which is to be held at Dominion Park from July 13 to 16 inclusive, the French Government, through its Montreal representative, will distribute decorations among seven members of the local French-Canadian community, in recognition of their services to their countrymen. Messrs. J. R. Genin, president of the Union Nationale Francaise; H. Barbier of the French consulate; Sheriff L. J. Lemieux, I. Perron, architect; Eugene Lesalle, P. N. Breten, Georges Gaurvrau of the Theatre Nationale, and Louis Guyon, inspector of public buildings, will participate. The first five will be presented with the title of officers of public instruction, while the two last named will become officers of the academy.

FOR LESS THAN ACRE OF LAND BAKER CO. GETS LARGE DAMAGES

After negotiations which started from November last, up to the present time, the Baker Lumber Co., Ltd., have succeeded in arriving at a settlement with the C.P.R. for the lands being taken by that company for Railway purposes. The final settlement was effected Tuesday, by which the Baker Lumber Co. gets \$15,000 in cash and some other

concessions for sixty-eight one-hundredths (68-100) of an acre of land. The railway company also pays the cost of moving the hydrant and also pays for constructing a roadway into the yards of the Baker company. It was a long drawn out affair in which many conferences were held. The Baker Lumber Co. was represented throughout the matter by T. H. Stinson, of McLaughlin, Peel, Fulton and Stinson.

LINDSAY'S RATE IS THIRTY MILLS ONE MILL HIGHER THAN LAST YEAR

Lindsay's tax rate is thirty mills on the dollar. The Protestant rate is thirty mills and the Separate school rate is thirty one mills.

The council at its special meeting last evening struck the above rate of taxation, and the necessary by-law was passed.

Reeve Vrooman in discussing, stated that when it was mentioned on the street that the rate would probably be thirty mills, there was a whoop of surprise and the council came in for considerable criticism and was termed a bad council. A great many people, however, did not understand

the future, the rate would be up to forty mills in a few years.

Deputy Reeve Dobson said he wished to take exception to the statement of Reeve Vrooman, that the council was not to blame. When the rate-payers came to the council for ratification, it would be gladly voted and when nomination day came round, the members held up their hands and said, "We did not do anything, to create those conditions."

Mayor Beal:—If each department of the council ran its own business, that body would not be so much to blame.
