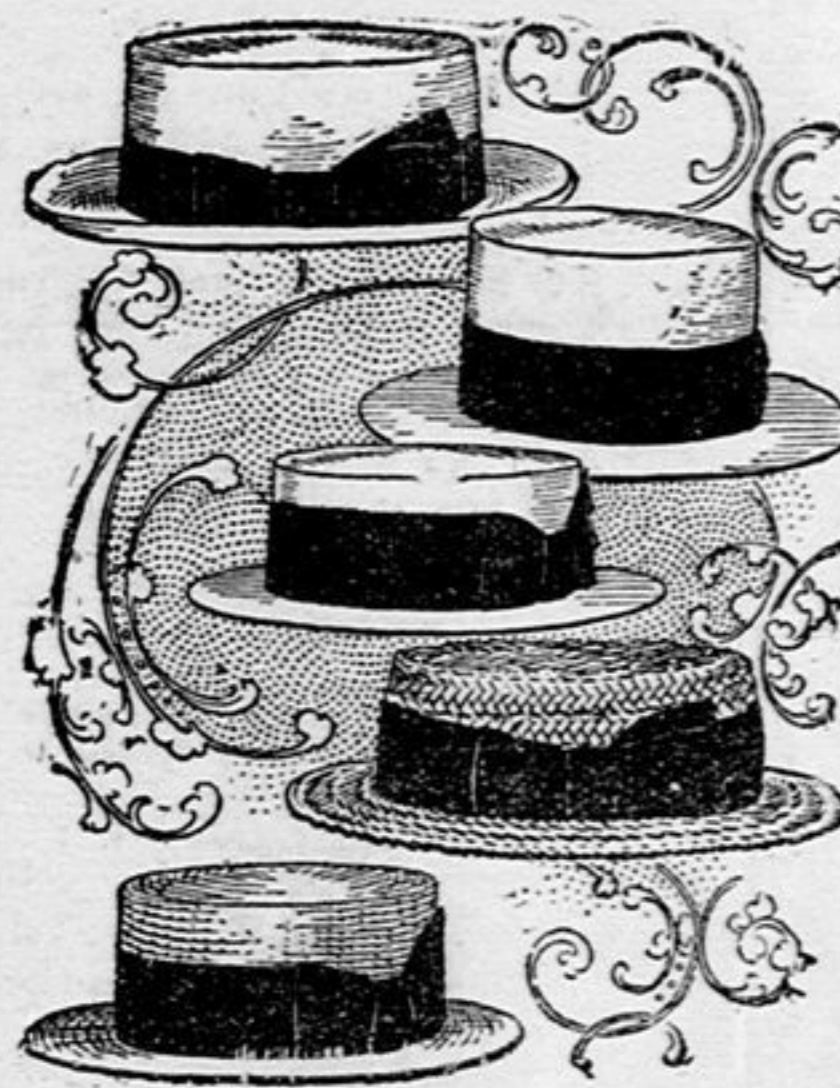

LETTER FROM FIRE DISTRICT

Mr. Robt. Smythe, Cambridge-st., has received word that his cottage in Northern Ontario is safe. It is situated on the Black River, between Matheson and Kelo. The country between these two places was swept by a fire and everything destroyed except a few places along the bank of the river. The writer of the letter to Mr. Smythe said it was so dark the day of the fire at 2 p.m. that they had to light a lamp to be able to see. The experimental farm at Monteith was saved. A back fire was started, thus leaving nothing for the flames to burn. Most of the town or Matheson was saved. Only seven buildings were left standing in Cochrane. The black flies have been bad since the fire. The loss of life has also been greatly exaggerated.

PIGEON CREEK BRIDGE CROSSED

Review: Yesterday W. G. Howden, chairman of the Roads and Bridges' Committee of the County Council, made inspection of the Pigeon Creek bridge, with the result that it has been closed to traffic. He found it so damaged by recent storms and winds and pushed out of shape by the masses of floating bog. The bridge was built 7 years ago, and is now so water soaked that it will hardly float. If it is to be retained in use it will require to be thoroughly rebuilt. It has been suggested that the best thing to do is to fill in the reach from shore to shore, as the water is shallow. No doubt a joint conference of the representatives from the city, county, and County of Victoria will be held to discuss the matter.
