William Workman, Ridout-st., received a copy of the Philadelphia Standard and Times from her Rev. Father Ryan of St. Peter's church, Pittsburg, containing the following reference to the death of another uncle, Rev. Thos. Field.

Thos Field, O.S.A., of the Mount of Consolation Cemetery Hill, and chaplain of Mount Joseph College, died on Wednesday at Villanova, in his eighty-first year. Father Field was born County Cork, Ireland, in 1829 and was a member of the Order of Augustines for forty-four years. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1871, and had been rector at Newburgh, N. Y., and Andover, Mass. In each of those places he built a church. His labors at Greenwood were a period of twenty-five years. He was also located at Lawrence, Mass., Cambridge, N. Y., Villanova, Pa., Bryn Mawr, Pa., and for the last eight years at Chestnut Hill.

His funeral will take place this morning from St. Thomas' church. The Divine Office will be at 9.30 o'clock. Very Rev. M. J. Magity, D.D., O.S.A., provincial of the Province of the Holy Spirit will celebrate the Solemn Requiem Mass. Rev. James O'Reilly, O.S.A., Lawrence, Mass., and Rev. F. J. Shann, O.S.A., of Atlantic City, will be deacon and sub-deacon, respectively, both being classmates of the deceased. Father McShane will officiate.

GREAT INVENTION IF IT STANDS TEST

London, July 6—Two trains without engine drivers, approaching each other at high speed on the same line of rails, automatically stopped when a collision seemed inevitable, at a demonstration given at Watchet, Somerset, today, by A. R. Angus of Sydney, New South Wales, of an electrical device, he has invented to prevent accidents. The experiment was witnessed by the chief representatives of British and French railways.

The sections of the railway used for the demonstration were marked by steel ramps, on inclined planes between the rails. A shoe, which is fitted on the engine, touched the ramps with a slight impact, and the driver is warned if the section is not clear by means of a disc or whistle. The driver may himself stop the train, but if he fails to do so, an electrical

apparatus with which the engine is fitted, automatically shuts off steam, applies the brakes and brings the train to a standstill.

This device was shown to work with perfect success. It was also demonstrated that the driver of a train thus automatically stopped can telephone to the nearest station to get any obstruction on the line removed, or any defect remedied, and he can not move the engine until this is done.

Flies, mosquitoes, and improper sewage disposal in the rural districts — three summer worries of health authorities are to receive more attention at the hands of the Provincial Board of Health.

Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, Chief Officer of Health, is having prepared circulars dealing with each one which will be distributed throughout the province. The question of sewage disposal in this country is a serious one, and a campaign of education will be educated to make the farmer and the residents of small towns and villages understand the importance of protecting their water supply. The information to be distributed points out the law and outlines the means by which sewage can be properly disposed of.

The circulars pointing out the way to exterminate the flies and mosquitoes will be printed in great quantities and sent to health officers and physicians all over the province.
