Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, Unicf Officer of Health, is having prepared circulars dealing with each one which will be distributed throughout the province. The question of sewage disposal in this country is a serious one, and a campaign of education will be educated to make the farmer and the residents of small towns and villages understand the importance of protecting their water supply. The information to be distributed points out the law and outlines the means by which sewage can be properly disposed of.
