## Col. Sam Hughes Among French Expressions of Loyalty to Throne

Montmagny, July 5—There was a real entente cordiale here last night, when Col. Sam Hughes, renowned for his Orange principles, Armand Lavergne, one of the leaders of the Nationalist party, and Cura Marois, a priest of the Catholic church, joined in public expression of loyalty to the British throne on the occasion of the presentation of new colors to the famous 61st Montmagny Regiment. The colors had been donated by Speaker Landry of the Senate, who is honorary colonel of the regiment. The ceremony took place outside the church, where the regiment formed three sides of a square. The flags, which are of silk, with gold lettering, were blessed by Cura Marois, the chaplain of the regiment who had the support of Captain Armand Lavergne, as adjutant of the regiment, and Lt.-Col. ## THE BAR AND BUSINESS

(The Globe.) The most significant support that Mr. Rowell is receiving in his fight for the abolition of the bar comes from men who are at the head of great business enterprises. When the Liberal party in the Legislature decided to make the abolition of the licensed bar one of the principal planks in its platform, Mr. Thomas Findley, vice-president of the Massey-Harris Company, employing thousands of workmen in its factories, expressed in strong terms his approval. The Massey-Harris Company suffers in Toronto from the too close proximity of the open bar, and some years ago offered to spend a large sum of money to provide other accommodation if the license near the works were cancelled. At the Belleville meeting the business advantage of temperance reform was presented in a striking way by Mr. Hugh Munro, M.P.P. of Glengarry, a partner in one of the large carriage manufacturing establishments of the Province. Alexandria, in which Mr. Munro's factory is located, has been dry for eighteen months. His testimony as a business man is that his own staff has increased greatly in efficiency under no license. There had been a very material reduction in drunkenness. Not one-tenth of the men once arrested now found themselves in the hands of the police. At one time when a circus or other entertainment visited the town men frenzied with liquor made the streets dangerous for women and children, and were so numerous that they could not all be arrested. The abolition of these conditions would be a boon to the workmen and bring happiness to many homes. It may be said that Mr. Munro is a Liberal and a follower of Mr. Rowell in the Legislature and that he is not a competent witness. Here is some testimony from the editorial columns of the Toronto World as to the relation of business interests to the liquor traffic. The World, discussing the circumstances under which a drunken locomotive engineer killed forty people to sudden death on the morning of the fourth of July says: "A drunken man is an ineffi-

cient man. This fact is doing more for teetotalism than all the legislation and propaganda in America. Nobody wishes to employ an inefficient person and the struggle for existence does not encourage his survival." Mr. Rowell and the Liberals of Ontario believe that most effective aid in lessening the drinking habit will come from employers of labor who approach the question, as the World does, from the business side. But they believe, also, that the state owes to the individual who has become inefficient the removal of the open bar, that tends to perpetrate and to increase his inefficiency. With confidence the Liberal party appeals to employers of labor throughout Ontario, who see their factory organization demoralized because of the operations of some nearby saloon, to aid in wiping out the bar. Sober workmen are efficient workmen. Sir James Whitney should be given to understand that there are many Conservative employers of labor in the Province to whose business interests and to whose workmen the open bar is a constant menace. To them the question is one of life and limb as well as of morals. Conservative manufacturers would do well to tell the Premier so in no uncertain terms and to warn him that their business interests and the physical and moral well-being of their employees are far more important than party alliance. The open bar must go. If Sir James Whitney stands behind the open bar he must go with it.

## HOW TO DEAL WITH SOME WEEDS

In the production of alfalfa seed the weeds to be especially watched are ragweed, ribgrass, bladder campion, trefoil and sweet clover. Usually it is only the perennial weeds which contaminate the seed if the killed out and thin places of field are taken care of with a scythe. In alsike, the docks are sometimes common. They should be pulled when in blossom after the ground has been softened with a rain, or they may be picked out when cutting the seed and burned. The campions, especially night flowering catchfly or sticky cockle, when in blossom shoot up above the alsike and if not too thick may be either pulled or the tops cut off with a sickle. It would be necessary to hand pull wild mustard from alsike and spud out any ox-eye daisy. Trefoil is hard to deal with in alsike. In red clover most of the wild mustard disappears with the first cutting. The rest must be hand pulled. Docks should be cut or pulled if they appear after the crop is removed for hay, and any other perennials must be dealt with in a similar way. Ribgrass and campion seeds are altogether too common in red clover seed, as are also those of

ragweed and foxtail. Sweet clover is becoming quite prevalent and be most easily removed from the first crop by pulling or spudding after a rain.

## FATHER PUNISHED HIS BOY IN COURT

St. Thomas, July 10—When a seventeen-year-old lad was brought before County Magistrate Hunt of St. Thomas, and pleaded guilty to a charge of committing an assault on a thirteen-year-old girl, the Magistrate gave the boy's father the option of administering a whipping in court or having the lad sent to the penitentiary for a flogging. The father accepted the first proposal, and with a rawhide he had purchased plied heavy blows on the boy's bare back in the court room. At the fifteenth blow the lad became insensible, and on the advice of the doctor the other ten lashes were not delivered. The offence for which the boy was corrected, took place a year ago, and the lad, who skipped to the United States, recently came back on his father's advice. The Magistrate gave an order to use the lash on all perpetrators of similar offences in the future.

## FENIAN RAIDERS GO PENSIONLESS

Ottawa, July 8.—The hundred dollars for each of the Fenian Raid veterans is to be a joy deferred. There is no money. The government put through a bill last season, but failed to ask parliament to vote the money. There are now forty thousand applications, and if these were granted, an expenditure of four hundred thousand dollars would be required. There is no authority to make a Governor-General's warrant to cover such an expenditure, and there can be no distribution until parliament meets and votes the money.

## INMATE LEFT THE HOUSE OF REFUGE

James Galloway, an inmate of the House of Refuge, was before County Police Magistrate Moore charged with taking French leave from that institution on June 19. He has been wandering about the country ever since and the magistrate gave him a severe reprimand and warned him against leaving the institution without the consent of those in authority over the House of Refuge.

## PROSTRATED BY THE INTENSE HEAT

The lightning and thunder was severe at times, and it is rumored that some damage was done. At Sturgeon Point and also at Pleasant Point the rain fell steadily for four hours. The accident to the Light, Heat & Power Co. line between Lindsay and Fenelon Falls caused considerable inconvenience to local power users. As soon as the storm had abated, the company promptly set to work to repair the damage and shortly after 4 o'clock everything was running smoothly again. The Bell Telephone Co's line between Lindsay and the Falls was also out of commission as a result of the storm.
