The above resolution was carried last evening by a two thirds vote of council, and which means that the town will purchase the property and residences on the northwestern corner of the park, fronting on Sus-MI and Peel-sts. The purchase price is \$7,000, and the county's proportion of the cost will be about \$1,750.
