WINNIPEG, July 11.—Reports received thus far have not definitely determined the standing of the parties in the next Legislature, but they indicate clearly enough that the Government will have a small majority, may be increased to a working efficiency in the three bye-elections yet to be held in the deferred northern seats. The Liberals claim a tie of 21 seats with the Conservatives, but with four seats to hear from. These are claimed by the Government, but also claim several of the seats which the Opposition in their own behalf. A detached estimate might put the final standing at 25 Conservatives and 21 Liberals, with three seats in dispute.

What the Government side claims is 27, as against their own estimate of 27. Liberals claim that they will have six seats now standing in the Government columns are so close that no accounts are inevitable, such as the Winnipeg election. The Government side claims a majority of but four, but the Liberal sweep in Centre and North-West is one of the most important things of the campaign.

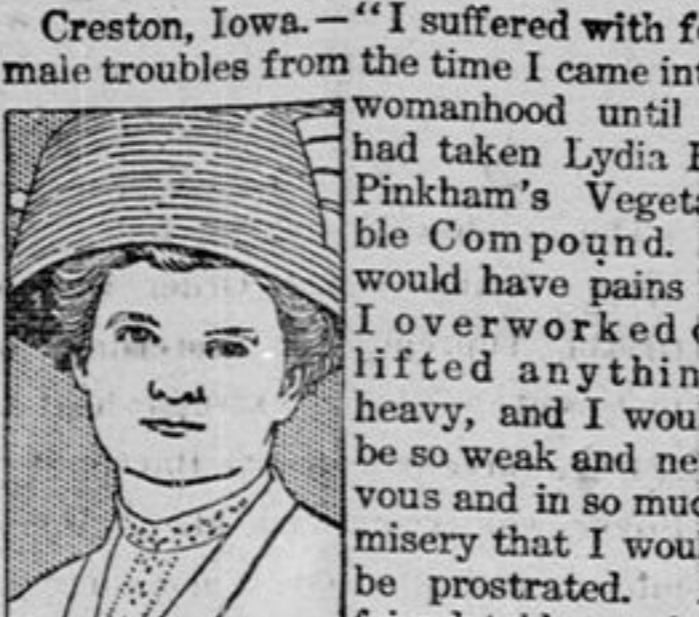

TRENT CANAL CONTRACT LET
LAKE SIMCOE TO GEORGIAN BAY

July 9.—Sir Robert Borden arrived from Halifax this morning after a fortnight's absence from the capital. He presided at a Cabinet meeting this afternoon, in the presence of Messrs. Reid, Doherty and others making up the necessary arrangements for the Trent Canal project. Several contracts were let, including the last section of the Valley Canal remaining to be completed under construction, from Lake Simcoe to Georgian Bay. It was awarded to the Randolph Macdonald company, and the amount involved is approximately \$900,000. The Hindu Bill passed at Vancouver was discussed in the House, but final action will be postponed until the return of the Minister of the Interior, Hon. Dr. Ferguson, from Manitoba next week. The Government has been instructed to arrange for the deportation of the Hindu Bill, and if necessary, and if necessary, the Government may decide to take action against the expense of taking the bill back to India.
