SALEM CORNERS

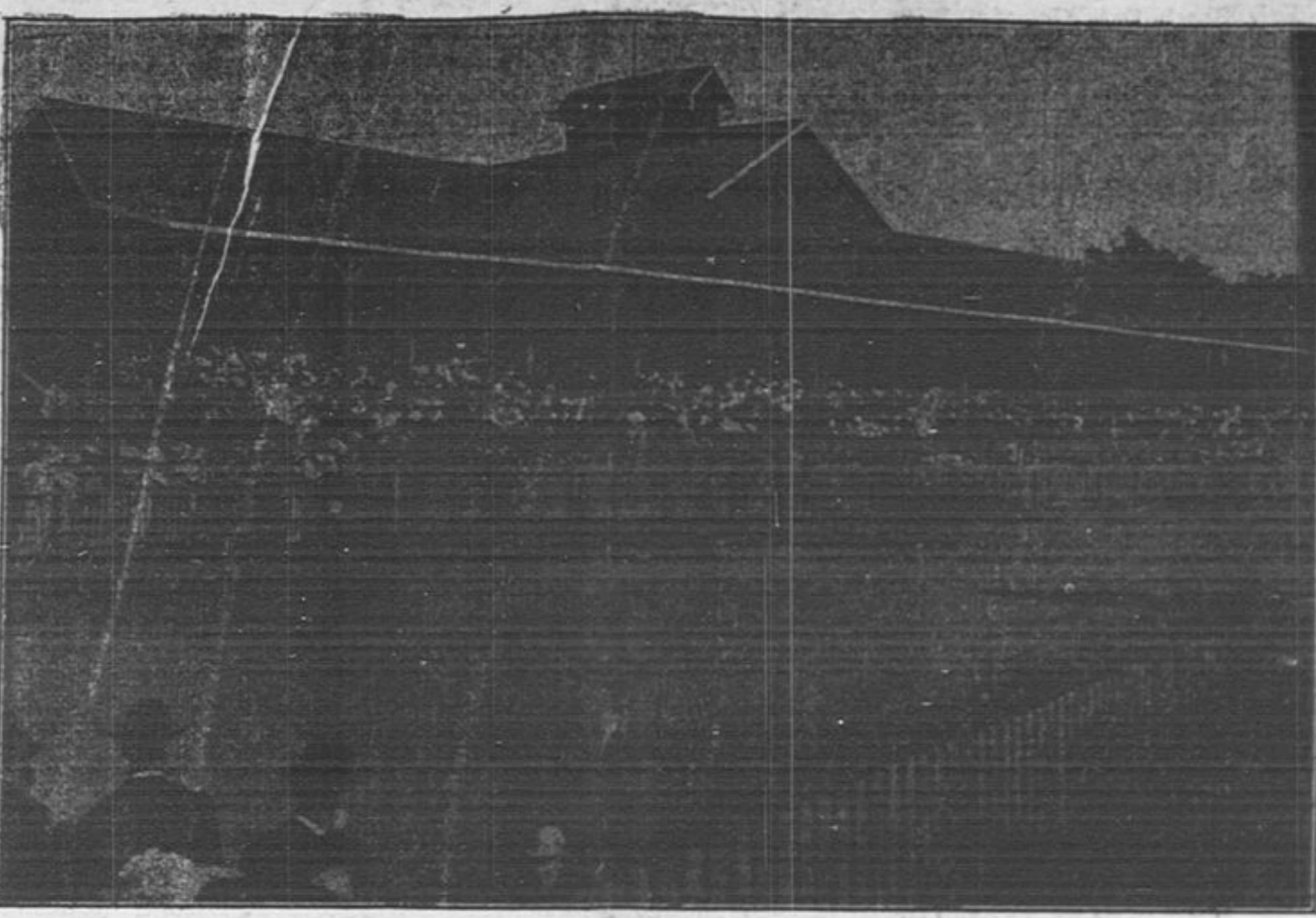
