POWLES' CORNERS. (Special to The Post.) The local school board is having a new steel shingle roof put on the school house.

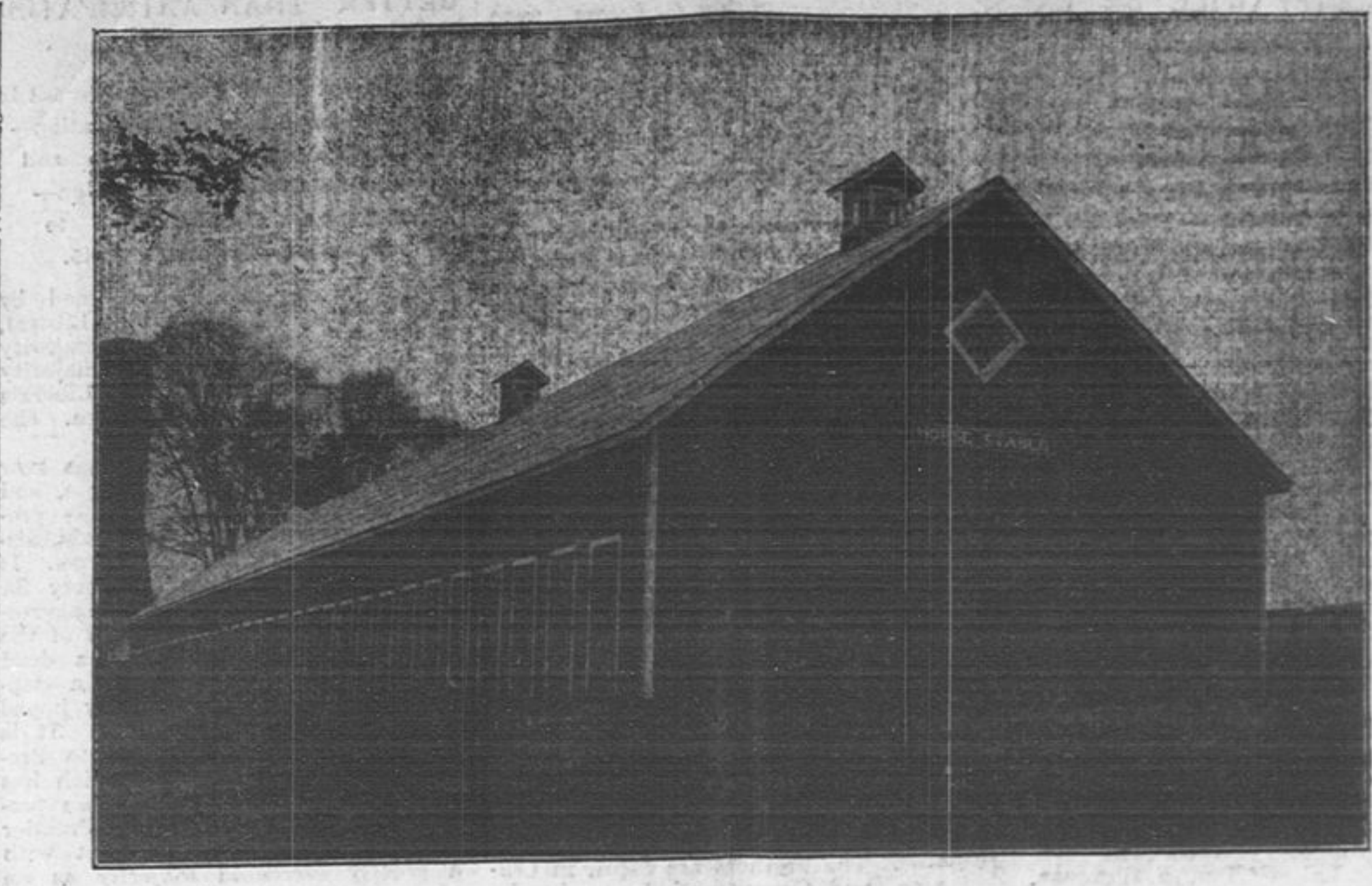
