

# M'GUIGAN GETS IT

## He Will Construct Hydro-Electric Transmission Lines.

### TO BE ALL CANADIAN JOB

Out of 27 Competing Companies, English and American, Late Grand Trunk Superintendent Outbids Them All by a Half Million—His Figure For the Work is \$1,270,000—A Great Saving.

Toronto, Aug. 14.—At 6 o'clock last evening F. H. McGuigan signed an agreement with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission for the construction of transmission lines from Niagara to St. Thomas in the west and Toronto in the east, 293 miles in all, for \$1,270,000.

The agreement was signed by the Hydro-Electric Commission to accept the tender of the F. H. McGuigan Construction Co. The tender was actually the lowest presented, the difference between the figures and those of the highest being \$500,000.

The tender was one of 27, there being one other bulk tender; 15 for the towers; five for cables, and five for the transmission line.

The tender is remarkable as being wholly Canadian, which, in the face of so many English and American tenders, is regarded as very creditable to native enterprise.

The steel towers, numbering 3,176, will be supplied by the Canadian Bridge Co., Walkerville, and the Ontario Iron & Steel Co., Welland. They will consume 6,554 tons of steel.

Steel Co., Welland. They will consume 6,554 tons of steel. The cables will be of aluminum wire, weighing 1,014,209 pounds.

For double telephone lines over the right of way 140,000 pounds of wire will be required, and the guard lines and lightning protection will also take a large quantity of metal.

Separate tenders were sent in for the several portions of the work, but Mr. McGuigan's tender was lower than the lowest combination of any of these. His tender was therefore accepted on its merits.

A marked check for \$35,000 accompanying the tender, and a bond for the execution of the work, amounting to \$175,000, will be provided.

The work is to be completed within 15 months of the signing of the contract, so that the line will be ready to deliver power in December of next year.

# MAJORITY GROWING

## Premier Scott Has Twelve by Latest Returns From Polls.

### BETTER THAN ANTICIPATED

Magnificent Victory of Government Is Tribute to Scott Administration—Campaign of Personalities and Abuse Ends in Vindication—Moosjaw County Goes to Sheppard—Estimates 25-15.
