The other day as one of our worthy citizens was coming down the river on one of the boats he was struck by the lay of the Wellington-st. bridge the sinuities of which, being in his line, appealed to his imagination. There are in the neighborhood of two dozen sleepers under the bridge which are the main supports and out of that number he could stick his knife up to the handle in twenty of them without any trouble.
