Runaway Team Causes Injury

Bobcaygeon Man Seriously Hurt While at Work

Mr. James Butterfield, of this place, met with a very serious accident on Monday morning last, while drawing some water from "Little Bob" river. His horses took fright and ran along the sawdust road at a furious pace till they came to the skating rink, where they made a short turn throwing Mr. Butterfield heavily on his head in the middle of the street. He was picked up in an unconscious condition, and Drs. Thorne and Boyd were called in and did what they could to restore consciousness, but without avail. His brain is affected, and the doctors fear that he has received internal injuries. The Hon. G. P. Grabam, Minister of Canals, accompanied by Deputy-Minister Butler and others, arrived here on the "Bessie Butler" last Friday afternoon. The party was driven down to the "Little Bob," where the new dam is being built, and our city fathers accompanied them. They were well pleased with what they saw of the works, and much delighted with the scenery of the Kawartha lakes.

On Monday evening, the 17th inst., the fire alarm was sounded at 7:20 p.m., and a horseman from "Little Bob" gave the news of a lively conflagration that was in progress in "Sawdust City." The fire engine was run down by a pair of horses and the firemen soon had two streams playing on the double building which was enveloped in flames. The fire in the building was soon under control, but it took about three hours to put out the sawdust which had taken fire in hundreds of places. At midnight the sawdust was well soaked, and the company took the engine and fire apparatus back to the fire hall. The Canada Year Book for 1907, that invaluable compendium of the most needed information about this vast Dominion, has just come from the press of the King's Printer. Mr. Archibald Blue's continual efforts to enlarge and improve this handbook

have led to the inclusion this year of the Post Office Census summary of live stock and crops in the provinces east of Lake Superior and the railway table has been modified to meet the new official classifications. So far as official events are concerned, the diary of the year is complete and excellent. How many people, for instance, are aware that in the course of it there were granted to the province of Alberta, by royal warrant issued to the hereditary marshall of England, the armorial ensigns following: "Azure in front of a range of snow-mountains proper and a range of hills vert, in base a wheat field surmounted by a prairie both also proper, on a chief argent, a St. George's cross." All the provinces now have these decorations.

ELECTIONS THIS FALL.

Ottawa, August 24—Sir Wilfrid Laurier came back to Ottawa this afternoon looking greatly benefited by his holiday. Many of the other Cabinet Ministers are in the city, and all the rest except Mr. Templeman will be here to-morrow to attend a meeting of Council. There is no doubt the question of the election will be tentatively settled. In fact, it is settled now, as the majority of the Government favor an appeal to the country this autumn, and the chances are ten to one the appeal will be made. This is well understood by both sides, as the political activity throughout the country indicates. However, there will be no dissolution of Parliament and no definite announcement of an election date immediately. The election will take place in October or November, and there is ample time still for dissolution.

In view of the coming struggle, it may be of interest to point out that the Government has an overwhelming majority in the House, and that it is drawn from every province except Ontario and Prince Edward Island. Nothing short of political earthquake, of which there are no signs, could convert the Government's great majority into a minority. The figures by provinces are: Ontario, Liberals, 39. Conservatives 47; Quebec, Liberals, 54. Conservatives 11; Nova Scotia, Liberals, 17. Conservatives 1; New Brunswick, Liberals, 3. Conservatives, 5; Manitoba, Liberals, 7. Conservatives 3; Saskatchewan, Liberals, 5. Conservatives 1; Alberta, Liberals 2. Conservatives 2; British Columbia, Liberals, 7. Conservatives, 0; Prince Edward Island, Liberal 1, Conservatives 3; Yukon, 1 Conservative. Total, Liberals 140; Conservatives 74. Liberal majority, 66.
