Serious Accident At Lorneville

An Uxbridge Resident Jumps from Train While in Motion

Woodville, August 4th. — A very distressing accident occurred this morning at Lorneville when a man by the name of Schofield, of Uxbridge a passenger on the train, had his feet run over by a car, as a result of which he now lies in a very serious condition. The morning train for Blackwater was just coming in to Lorneville and Schofield attempted to land before the train had stopped. In some manner his feet were drawn under the car and before he was aware of it the trucks of the car passed completely over them. He was at once placed on the car and taken to Woodville, where Dr. Galloway attended to his injuries.

It is likely that one of his feet will have to be amputated as a result of the injury. The injured man will be taken to the Ross Memorial hospital at Lindsay.

This Hall Has Done Its Duty

Ops Township Building At Cemetery Should be Torn Down

The Ops township Council has been interviewed by a committee of the directors of the Riverside cemetery, with a view to having the old township hall razed to the ground.

The structure, which is situated at the entrance to the cemetery, has certainly served its usefulness. It is only once a year—on polling day—it is used and it is unsafe at present. The walls are cracked and the flooring is in a rotten condition. A few years ago at a crowded nomination meeting the floor gave way and a hurried exit was made by the inmates through the door and window. It is at present a refuge for Weary Willies and its demolition would certainly add to the appearance of the cemetery as well as remove a source of danger, because it may collapse at any time.

The township Council would certainly be doing a good act if they decided to tear the structure down. It has now reached the condition when it is neither ornamental or useful.

Wants Control Of Her Forces

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA, Aug. 3.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The Argus says that the Imperial Defence Conference deliberations cannot lead to a successful conclusion unless Britain makes a full, intelligent provision for the diversified interests and local aspirations of the colonies. Australia is unalterably determined to build her own navy and train citizens by a system of compulsory cadet service.

"But," The Argus continues, "Australia, first and foremost, demands the service both of our soldiers and of our ships, and cannot permit another voice in their control. In an imperial crisis, Australia would gladly place the whole armament at Britain's disposal, but by consent not by compulsion."

The Argus remarks that the Little Englander now seems as rare as the Canadian or the Australian who would wish to cut loose from the Empire.

New York, Aug. 3.—"Oleomargarine used here," must be printed plainly and conspicuously, beginning yesterday, on all bills of fare in those restaurants throughout the state which serve substitutes for butter. Lunch carts, boarding houses and other eating places which do not rise to the dignity of menu cards, must post signs in places where they can easily be seen and read.

International Aviation Congress. Paris, Aug. 3.—It is reported here that France intends to call an international conference to discuss the question of aviation.

A summer's activity and progress in aviation in France will be crowned by the assemblage of the most renowned aeroplans at a "week of aviation" arranged to open at Rheims on Aug. 2.

One Experimenter Hurt. L'Orient, France, Aug. 3.—While experimenting here yesterday with a new military aeroplane of his invention, Lieut. Cros of the French army was caught in a squall and dashed to the ground. He sustained severe injuries on the head.
